THE PITZEL MURDERS.

Holmes the Accused Charged With Other Capital Crimes-Evidence Continues to Accumulate.

The Wife of the Suspect Will Be a Strong Witness for the Prosecution.

CHICAGO, July 22 -The search for the bodies of the missing Williams girls was resumed at the "castle" of H. H. Holmes, the suspected murderer, to-day. The police found a rope hidden beneath a quantity of rubbish. At one end is a plaited loop and at the other a "hangman's" noose. About the knot and on the noose were found several dark spots, which the police immediately concluded were blood stains.
