Mr. Robinson carried with him an important resolution passed by the inland board of trade at Kamloops asking for the removal of the Indians now occupying the reserve just outside of Kamloops to the Tchu-tchu-qualk reserve on the North Thompson river.

The resolution points out that the reserve just outside the city contains 32,000 acres and that only 200 of these are under cultivation. There are at least 7,000 acres in this reserve fit for fruit growing and general agricultural purposes.
