WILL ASK PROHIBITION FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Temperance Delegation to See Government on Tuesday.

Fredericton, Feb. 23.—C. Fraser MacTavish, St. John, secretary of the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance for 1913, is here to-day making arrangements for the temperance convention to be held by the Alliance to-morrow. It is expected that the convention will be representative of the temperance forces throughout the province. Three sessions are to be held, morning, afternoon and evening. The morning and afternoon sessions will be held at the Y. M. C. A. building and at the morning session the appointment of an organizer or organizers for the province will be taken up, while in the afternoon the organization of the temperance forces throughout the province will be the subject under consideration. During the afternoon a delegation will wait up on the Provincial government and urge the enactment of a prohibitory law for the province. In the evening the convention will take the form of a public meeting at St. Paul's Presbyterian church.
