JOHN T. HAWKE SUFFERS PARTIAL PARALYTIC STROKE.
Moncton, N. B., Jan. 1.—John T. Hawke, Editor and proprietor of the Moncton Transcript, and one of the best known newspaper men in Canada was taken suddenly ill yesterday afternoon and partial paralysis resulted. Tonight Mr. Hawke is reported to be slightly improved but his condition is precarious and it may be two or three days before there is any marked change. His physician does not anticipate immediate fatal results.

TWO DEATHS IN ONE FAMILY.
Two deaths took place at Bel River Crossing last week under very sad circumstances. Mr. John Boudreau died on New Year's day and his wife died on January 2nd. A son living at Bathurst was notified of his father's death but when he arrived home he found both his parents dead. A brother died a short time ago. Mr. Boudreau was 82 years of age, while Mrs. Boudreau was 73 years. The funeral was held at Bathurst on the 4th—the service being held in the church at which they were married.
