AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1907.

We, the undersigned, the auditors appointed by the Council of the town of Bridgetown to audit the accounts for the year 1907, do hereby report as follows:

We have commenced with the assessment roll of the town for the year 1907 and have carefully examined the making up of the taxes and find that the same are correctly made up.

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LOCAL AND SPECIAL.

Mr. E. E. Armstrong has purchased from Mr. Gilbert Feder the homestead on Queen street, known as the Thorne place.

The pacing mare, Kate Nelson, 2,101 by Red Lake, sire of Daisy DeWitt, 2-203, brought \$1300 at the recent New York horse sale.

The young people are holding another of their popular dance assemblies in Reginald Hall this evening. The Bridgetown Band will furnish the music.

The order of Robekahs, I. O. O. F., held a sleighing party last evening and were entertained at the home of one of their members, Miss Minnie Piegott, Centreton.

A meeting of the managers of the Valley branches of the Union Bank of Halifax was held here on Saturday.

E. L. Thorne, general manager of the Bank, was present.

Instead of the regular preaching service at the Methodist Church on Sunday evening next, there will be a People's Choral Service conducted by Prof. Morse, who has had charge of the choir for some weeks.

The service will include many familiar hymns, with incidents and stories of their origin, and a number of cantatas by the choir.

An alarm of fire was sounded Monday evening and the firemen soon had the hose cart at the head of Queen street, but it proved to be the burning of a chimney in the Grand Central Hotel and their services were not required.

The smoke and flames reflected in the observatory windows caused an appearance of fire in the roof.

Sleighing parties have been the principal pastime of the past week. On Monday afternoon Mr. Shaffer drove a party out to his lumber camp on the North Mountain.

The same evening a party of twelve drove in from Lawrenceton and made their stopping place the Grand Central, where mine host Coade had supper prepared for them.

The members of the Y. M. C. A. held a social in their Hall last evening, which was largely attended and was quite a social success.

Most of those present played pool and the members of the Club contributed a varied programme not omitting the serving of refreshments to their guests.

The gale of Saturday night did considerable damage in Middleton on the plate glass windows in Mr. G. W. Armstrong's store was blown out.

The damage being \$40 to \$50 with no insurance. One of the chimneys at the pottery was blown over. One of the old pines at the grove, at Lower Middleton was blown down.

The Clay Works two heavy pieces of roof were lifted and carried a considerable distance—Outlook.

On Friday last the H. & S. W. train with snowplough attached ran off the track near Ruffe's hill and the snowplough striking a large rock was broken. The train returned to Middleton and the regular running of the trains is suspended at present.

There are a number of snow blockades between Bridgetown and Victoria Beach, some of them being two or three hundred feet long. It is evident by the intention to wait for some assistance from nature in removing the obstructions.

The schooner G. M. Cochrane, Captain Innes, arrived at Yarmouth last week from Philadelphia with a cargo of 300 tons of hard coal. Captain Innes reported it the worst passage in his experience. The cabin was swamped in ice floes, and all the sails, excepting those, were torn so badly that they were useless.

The Cochrane came in under two trysails and one jib. She was covered with ice from stem to stern. A heavy sea, which hoisted her, struck the mate, George Emerson of Annapolis, and injured him so badly that upon arrival he was sent to the marine hospital at Yarmouth for treatment.

MRS. ARTHUR CHARLTON. The death occurred on Friday after noon of Mrs. Arthur Charlton, after a lingering illness through a complication of diseases. Mrs. Charlton leaves four little sons, the youngest of whom is but a few months old and much sympathy is expressed for the motherless little ones and the devoted husband who have been so sadly bereaved.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at the home, Rev. A. S. Lewis officiating and was largely attended, many friends thus paying their last tribute of esteem to one whose death will leave a void.

MRS. WILLIAM H. BENT. It becomes our painful duty at this time to chronicle the death of one of our oldest and most esteemed residents, Mrs. William H. Bent, which took place at her home on Monday the 7th, inst., from heart failure. Mrs. Bent was 88 years of age. She was the second daughter of the late Jacob Gosser and was born at Hillsboro, N. B. Mrs. Bent was a most estimable lady, refined, cultured, and most singularly gifted with those attributes almost divine, which not only made her loved by her own, but honored and revered by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance, and her going out has left a void which can never again be filled. Her funeral took place on the 9th and she was laid to rest beside her children in the beautiful cemetery of her native town. The Rev. E. Underwood officiated.
