TROTTING AT LIVERPOOL.

At the Liverpool Annual Grand International Trotting Alecting, hald on the 7th ult., the Local Trotting Stakes, heats of 21 miles, best 8 in 5, was won by Mr. Jenkinson's bay horse Tom (15 hands) in four heats. Time, 6:30, 6:80, 6:48, 6:37; eight starters. The Sefton International Trotting Stakes, heats of 21 miles, best 8 in 5, was won by Mr. Rooke's gr m Steel Grey (14 hands) in four heat. Time, 6:142, 6:11, 6:142, 6:071; five starters. On the following day the Grand International Trotting Stakes of 100 sovereigns, heats of 21 miles, best 8 in 5, was won by Mr. Weblin's gray horse, Salvini (15 hands) in five heats. Time, 6:19, 6:06, 486, 6:18, 6:18; sixteen starters. The concluding race for the Aintree Stakes, a dash of 24 miles, was won by Mr. Birchell's b m Polly Pork (15 hands) in 6:24; six starters.

The English appear to be breeding and training their trotting stock for much longer distances than the Americans, races of five and ten miles being not at all uncommon; the result of which, in the course of time, will be that the former will exc. Out of the hundreds of fast trutters now on. Out of the hundreds of fast trotters now on the American turf, it is safe to say not more than twenty at the outside are good for more than twenty at the outside are good for more than a mile at a rapid rate of speed, while in England, where such races are compara-tively new, large fields of undersized horses trot four and five heats of 21 miles each, at a rate of speed averaging from 2.40 to 2.50 to the mile, and retain their speed to the finish. As will be seen from above, a fifth heat of As will be seen from above, a fifth heat of 21 miles was recently trotted in Liverpool in 6:18, the sixteen horses entered having at the conclusion of the race trotted 111 miles each.
