LINDSAY, ONT.—The erection of a new school is under consideration.—Tenders will be taken up to 30th inst. for construction of Sussex street sewer.

EGANVILLE, ONT.—The ratepayers have voted in favor of giving \$5,000 towards new stone bridge over the Bonnechere river, to cost \$3,000.

HUNTSVILLE, ONT.—A by-law will be voted on May 3rd to assist the Muskoka Wood Mfg. Co. in establishing a factory.—A site for the new town hall has not been chosen.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—A deputation last week urged upon the Dominion Government that a suitable public building be erected here and that dredging and sheet piling be done.

ST. MARY'S, ONT.—It is proposed to submit a by-law to the ratepayers to raise \$16,000 for waterworks and electric light extension and the necessary sum for purchase of road roller.

GUELPH, ONT.—Voting on sewerage by-law takes place May 5th; estimated cost, according to T. H. Jones, consulting engineer, \$34,896.—J. Steele contemplates building a new factory.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—W. Rowntree has taken tenders on two stores on Dundas street.—R. E. Speakman, C. E., of Toronto, has been requested to submit plans for a system of sewerage.

CHATHAM, ONT.—T. J. Rutley, architect, will shortly invite tenders for church at Romney.—J. L. Wilson & Sons, architects, are preparing plans for residence for Dr. J. T. Wiley, of Dresden.

HULL, QUE.—Charles Brodeur has prepared plans for new school for girls, two-storey, brick, stone foundation.—By-laws were carried last week to raise \$73,000 by debentures for public improvements.

PETERBOROUGH, ONT.—Work will be started immediately on another building for the American Cereal Company, three storeys, of brick.

SARNIA, ONT.—The Council propose voting \$40,000 for road improvements.—The ratepayers have sanctioned the by-law to purchase a library site, but have defeated the one for permanent road improvements.

QODERICH, ONT.—The council has authorized the purchase of a street sprinkler, 600 feet of water pipe, hydrant, specials, and electric light transformers.—A new G. T. R. station to cost \$12,000 will be built here.

FREDERICTON, N. B.—A bill is before the New Brunswick Legislature in connection with a project to extend the Canada Atlantic Railway to the Atlantic seaboard. Dr. Seward Webb, of New York, is interested.

STRATHMORE, ONT.—Bids are invited by Donald McIntosh, up to 29th inst., for construction of the North Branch river and McIntosh Branch drains, to cost in all over \$14,000. Plans by T. H. Wiggins, C.E., Finch, Ont.

LISTOWEL, ONT.—W. M. Davis, C.E., of Berlin, has submitted to council a report on the disposal of sewage in this town. He recommends bacterial purification by septic tanks and filter beds, at estimated cost of \$6,763.

ORILLIA, ONT.—W. H. Croker, architect, is preparing plans for convent building in connection with the Church of the Angels' Guardian, also for summer cottage for W. J. Sheppard, of Waubesa, to be built about 3 miles from that place.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—Tenders are asked by Albert Bonin up to 18th inst. for erection of school house for R. C. Separate School Board. Plans at office of C. H. Wheeler, architect.—Fred W. White, architect, is taking tenders up to 21st inst. for residence of H. A. McKibbin.

SAULT STE. MARIE, ONT.—It is proposed to build an addition to the Baptist church, to cost about \$2,500. Rev. F. T. Tapscoff, pastor.—H. R. Halton, architect, has completed plans for residence for L. O'Connor, of Sudbury.—T. Black will erect two residences.

OTTAWA, ONT.—The C.P.R. has purchased the Ottawa and North-Western Railway and will extend the road from Waltham, Que., to Chalk river.—Plans are being prepared by the Dominion Government architect for new geological museum.—The water pipe will be extended to the new hospital site, at a cost of \$1,000.

HAMILTON, ONT.—Tenders close this week for nurses' building at hospital.—Charles Mills, architect, has been granted a permit for cattle sheds and pavilion for the Hamilton Stock Yards Co., to cost \$5,000.—The same architect has been instructed to prepare plans for several houses to be built by the Turner estate.

SYDNEY, N. S.—The ratepayers will vote on a by-law on 18th inst. to raise \$257,000 for waterworks, sewers, schools, etc.—It is proposed by C. M. Odell, C. E., who is now preparing plans for a complete system of waterworks, to use the steam plant at the electric light station to operate electric pumps in connection therewith.
