SOUTHERN AFRICA: THE WAY AHEAD: BRITAIN'S VIEW

BRITAIN IS FULLY AT ONE WITH THE REST OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN <u>UTTERLY CONDEMNING APARTHEID</u> AND WISHING TO SEE ITS TOTAL ERADICATION SO THAT ALL THE INHABITANTS OF SOUTH AFRICA CAN LIVE IN DIGNITY AND PLAY A FULL PART IN THE POLITICAL LIFE OF THEIR COUNTRY.

BRITAIN WELCOMES THE RECOGNITION IN THE KUALA LUMPUR STATEMENT:

- THAT CHANGE IS UNDERWAY IN SOUTH AFRICAJ

THAT SANCTIONS SHOULD NOT BE PUNITIVE AND THAT THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY WILL NEED TO RESPOND TO EVIDENCE OF CLEAR AND IRREVERSIBLE CHANGE; AND

THAT BOTH SIDES SHOULD COME TO THE NEGOTIATING TABLE IN AN ATMOSPHERE FREE OF VIOLENCE FROM EITHER SIDE.

BUT BRITAIN BELIEVES THE COMMONWEALTH CAN HELP A NEW SOUTH AFRICA TO EMERGE IN MUCH MORE POSITIVE WAYS THAN THOSE SET OUT IN THE KUALA LUMPUR STATEMENT.

IN BRITAIN'S VIEW THERE HAVE BEEN <u>IMPORTANT AND POSITIVE CHANGES</u> <u>IN SOUTH AFRICA</u> SINCE THE LAST MEETING OF COMMONWEALTH HEADS OF GOVERNMENT IN VANCOUVER. SEVENTY PER CENT OF WHITE SOUTH AFRICANS VOTED FOR CHANGE IN THE RECENT ELECTIONS AND THERE IS NOW A GOVERNMENT <u>FIRMLY COMMITTED</u> TO THE CONCEPT OF NEGOTIATIONS. PEACEFUL POLITICAL ACTIVITY BY THE BLACK MAJORITY HAS BEEN ACCEPTED AND EIGHT OF THE POLITICAL PRISONERS WHOSE RELEASE
