WATERTON GLACIER INTERNATIONAL PEACE PARK

Hon. T. G. MURPHY (Minister of the Interior) moved the second reading of Bill No. 97, respecting the Waterton Glacier International Peace Park.

Motion agreed to, bill read the second time and the house went into committee thereon, Mr. LaVergne in the chair.

On section 1—Proclamation.

Mr. ERRICK F. WILLIS (Souris): Mr. Chairman, the present occasion offers an opportunity of presenting to this house certain facts in regard to the project known as the International Peace Garden of America.

May I say in a word that there is now in practically the geographical centre of this continent, a garden of three thousand acres, in the Turtle mountains donated to the people of North America by the governments of the province of Manitoba and the state of North Dakota, for the purpose of a living and lasting memorial to the greatest peace ever existing between two nations.

May I direct the attention of this house to the background, organization, and plans of this project, which in the future will, I believe, be well known to you all.

The idea of a beautiful garden on the international boundary was first thought of by an eminent Canadian horticulturist, Mr. Henry J. Moore, of Islington, Ontario, in 1928, and was suggested to the convention of the National Association of Gardeners held in Toronto in August, 1929. The project met with the heartiest approval of the audience which represented thirteen United States horticultural societies, and practically all of the major horticultural organizations of Canada. The association formed a peace garden committee which committee organized an international committee. This committee has changed slightly from time to time in personnel, but is at present as follows:
