Background information on that meeting of November 7 indicated that the federal Government said a CEIC industrial adjustment service agreement "may also be negotiated to assist those displaced workers presently employed at the Sysco coke ovens in preparing for and endeavouring to obtain alternate employment". Where is this assistance and where is this agreement? Why can the people of Sydney not rely on the promises of the Government?

HISTORIC EVENTS

ESTONIA—ANNIVERSARY OF INDEPENDENCE

Mr. Andrew Witer (Parkdale—High Park): Mr. Speaker, 70 years ago on February 24, 1918, Estonia became a free and independent nation. The Soviet Union brought an end to that freedom in 1940 when Estonia and other Baltic states were forcibly annexed to the U.S.S.R. Estonia remains occupied by Soviet troops to this day.

Canada's position on the illegal occupation of the Baltic nations is clearly stated in the Prime Minister's (Mr. Mulroney) message to the Estonian community marking this seventieth anniversary of Estonian independence, and I quote:

Canada has never recognized in law this act by the U.S.S.R., nor have we any intention of doing so now.

The Estonian community in Canada invite all freedomloving Canadians to join with them in commemorating this spirit of independence and in demonstrating their desire for liberty and justice in their homeland.

I call upon the Secretary of State for External Affairs (Mr. Clark) to use all available measures to maintain pressure on the Soviet Union until its illegal occupation of Estonia is ended and that country once again takes her rightful place among the free and independent nations of the world.

TOURISM

EFFECT OF GASOLINE PRICE INCREASES

Mr. Fernand Robichaud (Westmorland—Kent): Mr. Speaker, the Conservatives have again shown little concern for Canada's tourism industry. In its last Budget the Government again increased the price of gasoline by one-cent a litre. Add this to the two-cent a litre hike in the excise tax announced in September, 1985, the one-cent a litre increase in January,

1987, and the one-cent a litre hike announced in February, 1987.

These increases, coupled with a 3 per cent hike in the sales tax since 1984, have made gasoline prices in Canada very uncompetitive with our largest tourism customer, the United States. Today the price of gasoline in Canada is over 50 per cent higher than in the U.S. This difference will certainly have a negative effect on the number of American visitors to Canada.

The ever-widening gap in the price of gasoline has prompted the Canadian Automobile Association to state that transportation related industries in Canada will be unable to compete with their American counterparts as we enter a free trade era.

For many regions in the country, tourism is one of the few industries with real growth potential. Tourism has enormous potential for job creation. Why is the Conservative Government attempting to choke off this industry?
