Working with three prime ministers and a multitude of provincial premiers, he assumed the status of senior statesman on this issue. He believed to the core of his being that Canada was a unique land, a land endowed with a host of treasures: its natural resources; its rugged and profound beauty; its magnificent peoples that make Canada their home. His contribution to the cause of national unity will be sorely missed. His legacy, however, will live on.

I believe that when the history of Canada is written, Richard Bennett Hatfield will be accorded the place of honour he so richly deserves: consummate premier of New Brunswick, avowed pan-Canadian, reformer and leader.

Mr. Douglas Young (Acadie—Bathurst): Mr. Speaker, Richard Bennett Hatfield served the people of New Brunswick as premier for 17 years. He led his Conservative Party to an unprecedented four election victories, taking the measure of four Liberal leaders, including the member for Acadie—Bathurst.

Richard Hatfield was proud of his deep understanding of New Brunswickers and his finely honed political instincts rarely failed him, especially when it came to what the electors expected from their premier and their government. Premier Hatfield often said that the secret of his success was that he trusted New Brunswickers and they trusted him because he reflected their values and their principles. He was always supremely confident that their sense of justice and fairness would prevail, come election time, and four times out of five he was right.

Richard Hatfield was a truly great Canadian. Throughout our negotiations with the provinces on the patriation of the Constitution as well as on the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, what I found most impressive in this man was the wonderful courage he has shown throughout his political career. He has never been afraid, although himself an anglophone, to confront individuals who did not appreciate at all what he was doing to promote the French fact in New Brunswick.

Also, as the previous speaker noted, he was incredibly ahead of his time and displayed a tremendous strengh of character on these two issues, even if he lived in a society which made it difficult at times to champion the rights of the native people. Every minute of every hour I have spent working with him was enjoyable; his behaviour was always proper and he was very witty. He never looked
