

exploded, and have proved a source of misfortune to this country, yet it is neither wise nor necessary that she should abandon her remaining colonies on the continent, except it should also appear to be for her interest to give up the fisheries, the West India islands, her East India possessions, and, eventually, her formidable navy. But, when other maritime nations have put in practice such lessons, it will then be time enough for Britain to learn them.

In the present situation of things, her unfortunate faithful subjects in America call aloud on her humanity, and claim that grateful attention, which is equally due to their attachment and their sufferings. While this is bestowed, there are objects at home which cannot be neglected, without diminishing the national grandeur, and ultimately affecting the happiness of individuals. It is the interest of our country to attend to the following things.
