JURY DECLARED BECKER GUILTY

Fate Decided on Single Ballot —Counsel to Make Appeal.

(Continued From Page 1.)

not permitted to accompany her husband to the courtroom. Newspaper men, court attendants, counsel for the defense, and District Attorney Whitman and his staff were the only other persons allowed admission.

Becker in the room overhead was still talking to his wife when Justice Seabury took his seat. Clerk Penny called "Charles Becker to the bar," and a bailiff went for the defendant. Becker kissed his wife and left her.

"It's all right," he told her. "Don't worry, they will free me."

Becker almost overcame. He entered by the same door the jury had passed through but a minute before. He walked briskly to the rail facing Justice Seabury and gripped it with both hands.

Clerk Penny asked the jury to rise. "Foreman," he said, "have you reached a verdict?"

"Blagden, a young man, blonde and slim, brushed his eyes with a handkerchief, already damp. "We have," he said softly. "We find the defendant guilty as charged in the indictment; guilty of murder in the first degree."

Becker's face was gray as he gripped the bar in front of him with all his strength. The five muscles of his neck jumped out in heavy rolls. The veins at his temples swelled. His great frame quivered and he dropped, then with quick control he became himself again.

The whole proceeding from the time Becker was pronounced guilty until a recess was declared, occupied scarcely four minutes.

Mr. Becker, learning the verdict, threw his arms around his neck and buried his face on his shoulder.

"Oh," she cried, "Charlie, I'm so sorry, so sorry. I didn't expect it."

Becker stood, looking down at her as she wept.

Handcuffs were then locked around his wrists. He was taken from the room and around the marble corridor to the other side of the building, across the "Bridge of Sighs," and into the Tombs.

Another Appeal.

Immediately after the court was adjourned Mr. Manton said: "I fall to see how the jury managed to convict Becker in view of the conflicting evidence that was presented by the witnesses for the state and the testimony that the witnesses gave. However, it has been done. I will immediately set to work to prepare an appeal. We will fight, and fight hard to have Becker cleared of the charge."

District Attorney Whitman expressed himself as highly gratified with the verdict. "It speaks for itself," he said. "Becker is guilty. It was proved. He must pay the penalty of his crime."
