ARGENTINA SCARE DWINDLES WHEAT ADVANCE CHECKED

Buenos Ayres Quotations, No. 3 Inspected steeps, cows Which Closed Unchanged From Previous Day, Put a Damper on Bull Campaign

CHICAGO, Dec. 6 .- Wheat today failed to hold an advance based on cables confirming damage from hot winds in Argentine, Closing prices were easy at a net gain of only a shade. Corn finished unchanged to 3-8c lower, and oats 1-8c to 1-4c off to 1-8c up. In provisions, the outcome varied from 2 1-2c to 5c decline to a rise of an equal amount.

Anxiety about mischief to wheat in Argentina waned completely when Buenos Ayres quotations closed at the same level as the previous day. Latest reports were that the area affected was not as extensive as at first supposed, and that the prospect elsewhere was good. Another influence against the bull side was found in millers, reports showing a larger winter crop acreage in the United States than last year and a higher condition.

Big longs in wheat sold on the advance and bought back again at 1-2c reduction from the top.
