APPEAL TO BOARD OF HEALTH

New York, Nov. 1.—There is no settlement in sight of the trouble between the New York Transportation Company and its striking chauffeurs and practically all the companies' automobiles are still tied up.

To-day the strikers appealed to the board of health to investigate a charge that the company is violating the lodging-house law in permitting men who have been hired to take the strikers' places to sleep in the garage.
