Chariton, Edgar, Mulock, Lister, McMullen and other aspirants for Cabinet rank, whose claims it will be difficult to ignore? And what of the famed John McMilian, the critic of the Experimental Farms, who is slated for Minister of Agriculture, but who will clearly have in that direction to Mr. Sydney Fisher, the gentleman farmer from Broome? Brother Fraser, the Guysboro Giant, is looked upon as a sure Minister from Nova Scotia. Associated with him may be T. B. Flint of Yarmouth, a very wealthy man and of some ability. As the Island gets a representative in Mr. Davies, it is altogether likely that New Brunswick will nave to be content with one representative in the Cabinet. D'Alton McCarthy's double return will re-open Brandon, and enable Mr. Laurer to secure one of the present anitoba ministers as representative of the great west, if he so desires. The Territories and British Columbia will be left out in the cold. It is regarded as almost certain that Sir Henry Joly will be one of the Quebec Ministers.
