

THORN ADMITS THE KILLING

Acting Inspector O'Brien Has His Confession.

THE GULDENSUPPE MURDER

Appears Likely to be Fixed on the Guilty Parties.

Thorn Went Early to the Woodside House and Awaited the Arrival of Mrs. Nack and the Victim—Thorn Was Concealed Behind the Door of the Closet and Heard the Unsuspecting Guldensuppe Coming Up the Stairs at Mrs. Nack's Request—Shot the Man in the Head as He Opened the Door. Then, Dragged the Body Downstairs and Shoved it into the Bath Tub.

New York, July 7.—The prisoner who was arrested last night has been positively identified as Martin Thorn. Acting Inspector O'Brien said today that he had in his possession a full confession from Martin Thorn, admitting that he had murdered Guldensuppe, and giving all the details of the crime.

Thorn's Confession. The confession which Acting Inspector O'Brien has in his possession and which presumably was made to John Dolph, the harbor who betrayed Thorn, gives the full history of the crime. According to this document the murder was committed in the house at Woodside which had been rented by Mrs. Nack.

A week ago last Saturday, according to the confession, Thorn went early to the Woodside house and hid in a closet in the upper floor. In his pocket he had a loaded revolver, and beside him was a two-pot package of plaster of paris. Then he waited for the arrival of Mrs. Nack and Guldensuppe. He took off his shoes so that no accidental noise could spoil his carefully laid plan.

The Unsuspecting Victim. It was between 10 and 11 o'clock in the morning when Mrs. Nack and her unsuspecting victim, Guldensuppe, drove up in the survey which has been mentioned in the previous stories of the mystery. Thorn heard Mrs. Nack ask Guldensuppe a few questions about the house, and heard Guldensuppe's answer. Then Mrs. Nack said: "Will you wait for me. Go through the house and see how you like it."

"Oh, I'll just stay here until you come back," Guldensuppe replied. Mrs. Nack, however, was anxious not to see the actual transaction of the tragedy she had planned. "No, don't wait here," she urged, "go and see the rooms upstairs. I think you'll like them."

Thorn, concealed behind the door of the closet, heard Guldensuppe's steps on the stairs as he complied with the woman's request. Carelessly Guldensuppe opened door after door, until he came to the closet where Thorn stood. As the door opened, Thorn shot Guldensuppe right in the head. He died almost instantly.

Then Thorn took hold of the body by the shoulders, dragged it downstairs and shoved it into the bath tub. Then Thorn went to the ground floor, where Mrs. Nack was waiting. "Is done," said Thorn. "I know," replied Mrs. Nack. "Now go back to the city," Thorn said to Mrs. Nack, "and come back here at exactly 5 o'clock. Everything will be ready."

Carved Up the Body. All this conversation and much more is embodied in the alleged confession. Mrs. Nack obeyed Thorn's injunction and the murderer returned to the bath tub. He cut off the head with razor and saw. Then he packed the head closely with plaster of paris, until it looked like a block of white soap. Then he took the legs off, and after that the torso in the cheese cloth. He wrapped it in the cheese cloth, then in the oil-cloth, tied the bundles neatly, lit a pipe and sat looking at his handiwork. He sat there until Mrs. Nack returned in the survey. Carrying the bundles with him, they both took the ferry boat across to New York. On the way over they threw the bundles into the river. How one portion of the body was found in the woods is not explained in the confession.

Thorn arrested. Thorn was arraigned in the Jefferson-market Police Court today and remanded until Friday, when Mrs. Nack's case comes up. When Thorn was arraigned in the Jefferson-market Police Court, despite the apparently damning evidence of this confession, he had a perfectly self-possessed appearance. Lawyer Friend, counsel for Mrs. Nack, said that he would look after Thorn's interest for the present.

Among the facts which have come to light since Thorn's arrest, there are several which indicate a great lack of caution in the methods employed by the alleged murderer. Thorn is said to have taken the watch and chain from Guldensuppe's clothing and to have pawned them. Despite rumors to the contrary, he appears to have made absolutely no effort to leave the city, and beyond shaving off his moustache, to have taken but few steps to prevent his detection. In his room there was found a valise which contained copies of all the newspapers giving full accounts of the find of the portions of the body, and from day to day he had cut out the stories which traced the crime home to himself.

An expert chemist to-day commenced to make an analysis of all the foreign matter found on the pistol. Knife and saw which were taken from Mrs. Nack's apartments.

What O'Brien Says. Acting Inspector O'Brien is quoted as saying that Thorn has made a statement in which he positively denies that he murdered Guldensuppe or knows who did it. An examination has been made of the bath tub of the house at Woodside, and in a trap underneath the tub about a pound of plaster of paris has been discovered. This find is regarded as strengthening the circumstantial details of the alleged confession.

A Big Beer Combine. Pittsburgh, July 7.—Ten of the largest breweries in Allegheny County have consolidated under the name of the Pennsylvania Brewing Company. The company is capitalized at \$10,000,000. The management positively deny that there will be any attempt made to increase prices to retailers or consumers. The sole object, they say, is to better control the market and lessen expenses.

ONTARIO MEDICAL COUNCIL.

Government Will be Thanked for Removing the Duty From Medical Books and Instruments.

Yesterday's session of the Medical Council of the College of Physicians and Surgeons was a short one. The day was principally occupied in committee work. A motion by Dr. Brock, seconded by Dr. Linton, thanking the Dominion Government for removing the duty from medical books and instruments was passed without objection.

After the motion had been declared carried, Dr. Hoome, ex-M.P., said that political questions of this nature should not come into the council in any shape or form. They will give rise to adverse criticism. The meeting then adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning.

OFFICIAL MINING EXPERT

Will Make an Extended Survey of Eastern Ontario and Report to the Bureau of Mines.

Mr. W. G. Miller, professor of geology in the Kingston School of Mining, has been engaged by the Bureau of Mines to explore the mining districts of Eastern Ontario. He will devote special attention to the Cornwall, Prescott and Frontenac. He is also instructed to report respecting gold, iron or other economic or valuable minerals found in the region under his charge. He has already gone east and will start in at Wilberforce on the Ottawa, Ironside and Bancroft Railway. In short, Prof. Miller is to operate in Eastern Ontario in the same manner as Dr. Coleman is doing in the Northwestern part of the province.

NINE MEN KILLED.

A Boiler Explosion on a Farm in Tennessee Which Was Disastrous.

Hartsville, Tenn., July 7.—A boiler exploded on the farm of W. A. Allen, this county, yesterday, and Mr. Allen and eight others were killed instantly and five badly injured.
