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WEDDING FROLIC AND DEATH.

Beer Caused Sleepiness and Cigarettes Started a Fire Which Cost Four Human Lives.

Cincinnati, Aug. 5.—Otto Adler kept an all-night restaurant in the lower story of the house in which three men and one woman perished this morning. There were seventeen men and women in one room in the second story of this house. The occupants of the building refuse all information. None of the dead were burned. They were suffocated by smoke from the fire in adjacent rooms. The only exit for escape was blocked by a bath set up on end at the head of the staircase. The smoke came from an adjacent room, where the fire was soon extinguished.

It seems that it was a wedding frolic, in which Guth, one of the dead men, was bridegroom, and the daughter of Landlord Adler was the bride. Still there is some doubt about who was the bride. The celebrants of the wedding used beer and cigarettes very freely, and it is now supposed cigarettes started the fire and that beer caused the somnolence which with the up-turned bath tub was the indirect cause of so much fatality. It seems that, while out of the seven men who were suffocated fatally, the other thirteen suffered but slightly. The fire started from the explosion of a gas-line stove.

CORNER IN COTTON.

Over 9000 Bales in Store and Holding for the September Movement.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 5.—Cotton is said to be cornered in this city, and is likely to remain so until Sept. 1, when the official cotton year opens and the new crop begins to move. The statement of the local warehouses shows that the total amount of bales on storage aggregated 9082 bales. At year at this time there were 25,233 bales. Of the 9082 bales now in hand over 9000 are held by one firm, the Allen-West Commission Company.

James H. Allen of the latter company, when asked if there was a corner, replied: "This is the end of the cotton season of 1896-97, and spot cotton is mighty scarce at all the leading points in New Orleans and St. Louis. We have over 9000 bales on hand, and we are holding onto it, as nearly half of that cotton is two years old and is well seasoned, and even the crop of two years ago was finer than last year's growth." He would not admit the existence of a corner.

DOCTORS PROSECUTE.

A Man Who Charges Them With Conspiracy to Commit a Fraud—A Choice Epistle.

There was a peculiar case in yesterday's Police Court, the defendant being F. J. Peel of Brampton, who was charged with accusing Drs. D. D. Thorburn and J. Burnham with conspiring with intent to commit a fraud. Dr. Thorburn performed an operation upon a little daughter of Mr. Peel. Dr. Burnham had sent Peel to Dr. Thorburn. The fee for the operation was \$10 and Peel paid it. When Peel got home he was told that the charge had been extorted, so he penned this epistle to Dr. Thorburn:

"Brampton, July 20, 1897.
"Dear Sir, Evidently you and your accomplices took me for a woodenhead of the common variety. I have to inform you that I will immediately institute legal proceedings against you both unless the amount which I paid you is forthcoming at once.
"I shall certainly make it my business to give you a free advertisement unless my request is acceded to.
"I have your receipt as additional evidence of the fraud perpetrated."
The case was called on Monday, Peel having pleaded not guilty.
