Civil Servants' Salaries Won't be Made Liable to Seizure on Judgments.

THE PLEBISCITE COST MONEY

Mr. Davin Claims That the Liberals Have Not Kept Faith With Western Farmers.

Ottawa, June 26.—(Special.)—In the Commons this afternoon six questions were answered and seven were allowed to stand on account of the Ministers interested not being present.

Chinese Labor in B. C.

Mr. Prior was informed by the Premier that the Government was aware that a number of statutes passed by the local Legislature of British Columbia contain a clause prohibiting the employment of Chinese and Japanese labor.

Faith Not Kept With N. W. Farmers.

Mr. Davin moved that in the opinion of this House, faith had not been kept with the farmers of the west since duties have not been reduced on agricultural implements to establish friendly relations with President Kruger, but all their advances had been received with contempt.

Deliberate and Emphatic Talk.

After denouncing in the most emphatic and deliberate manner the attitude and actions of the House, Mr. Chamberlain, with great deliberation and emphasis, added that the Government secret service had procured it and advocates in every country.

WEST ELGIN VACANT AGAIN.

It Only Took an Hour and Twenty Minutes to Throw Out Mr. Donald Macnisch.

SEAT CLAIMED FOR MR. McDIARMID.

Gross Irregularities Took Place and the Returning Officer Must Pay the Costs.

St. Thomas, June 26.—The election trial against the return of Donald Macnisch as representative of West Elgin in the Ontario Legislature commenced in the Duncombe Opera House at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The first charge proceeded with was the appointment of deputy returning officers. It was shown that in several divisions the right persons did not act, and justice officer voided the election, with costs on the returning officer, Sheriff Brown.

THE LORDS KILLED IT. Bill Legalizing the Election of Women as Councilors Thrown Out by a Big Majority.

London, June 26.—The House of Lords today defeated the bill legalizing the election of women as councilors and aldermen. The vote stood 132 against the measure and 68 in favor of it.

FLOWER OF BRITAIN'S ARMY

Passed in Review Before the Queen Yesterday on the Famous Plains of Aldershot.

EIGHTEEN THOUSAND ON PARADE

And All Are Ready at a Moment's Notice to Take the Field if Called Upon.

London, June 26.—Her Majesty the Queen, the Duke of Cambridge, the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, Grand Duke Michael of Russia, the Duke of Connaught, Gen. Lord Wolseley, commander in chief of the army, and many princes and princesses were present on the famous plains of Aldershot to-day to witness a review of over 18,000 of the best troops in the Kingdom.

Ready at a Moment's Notice.

Not since the Queen's Jubilee has a more magnificent army corps passed before a European sovereign, and while 6000 additional troops remained in their barracks, the display afforded the Queen ample evidence of Her military resources.

Enthusiasm All Round.

Nearly all the foreign attaches were present, and a profound impression was made upon them as the dragons, the Scots—the famous Royal Regiment of which Emperor William is the colonel—the Buffs, the Camerons, the Scottish rifles and other heroes of the Zulu campaign passed.

GERMANY WILL NOT GO IN.

Russia's Disarmament Proposal Knocked in the Head in an Emphatic Way.

SENSATION AT PEACE CONFERENCE

German Delegate Delivered Smashing Blow to the Hopes of the Peace-makers.

The Hague, June 26.—The first committee examined to-day the Russian proposals relating to military effectives and budgets. Col. Gross von Schwarzhoff of the German Legation declared that Germany could not enter into any engagement not to increase her naval and military effectives.

The committee referred the Russian proposals to the special commission of the Naval and Military sub-committee. The Drafting Committee on Arbitration adopted the first reading of the proposed code of procedure on arbitration.

THE BUDGET FROM WINNIPEG

Hon. Hugh John Macdonald Told of His Warm Reception at the Federal Capital.

MR. J. A. MACDONELL'S IMPRESSIONS

He Thinks the Ottawa House Will Be in Session Till September—Local Nominations.

Winnipeg, June 26.—(Special.)—Hon. Hugh John Macdonald returned from the East to-day. He was delighted with his visit, and meeting with the leaders of the Conservative party. He has entered upon the active work of the campaign, which he expects will be on almost immediately after the House reassembles next week.

J. H. Black was nominated by the Liberal Conservatives to contest Kildonan.

J. A. Macdonell, M.P. for Selkirk, returned from Ottawa yesterday, and will remain here for a few days. Speaking of events at the Federal Capital, he stated that but little progress had been made in Parliament, it evidently being the intention of the Opposition to obstruct, in order to enforce a compromise or a complete withdrawal of the redistribution bill. He said it will be September before the House is projected at the present rate of doing business.

Just before leaving Ottawa, Mr. Macdonald was informed by D. D. Mann that his company intended to reconstruct and operate the old H. B. Railway and extend it to some extent on Lake Manitoba, and in time to point it still further.

Birtle Conservatives have nominated W. M. Howard of Birtle.

Springfield Conservatives have nominated E. F. Hutcheon of Springfield, the most prominent business man of Winnipeg.
