THE GORGE RAILWAY SOLD. Lockport, N. Y., May 23.—The Gorge Railway, running from Niagara Falls to Lewiston, was sold by Sheriff Kinney at the court house here this morning to Herbert P. Bissell, of Buffalo, for \$6,184, subject to a mortgage of \$1,000,000 held by the Knickerbocker Trust Company.

PHILIPINOS PLEASED PERSONALLY

With the U. S. Plan of Government and Proclamation.

But Not Prepared to Indorse It Officially—Gen Luna Is Dictator.

Manila, May 23.—6:15 p.m.—The Filipino commissioners spent the day at the residence of the American commissioners. They discussed every point of the scheme of government and the peace proclamation by details, asking for information as to what personal rights would be guaranteed them.

The Filipinos also desired information as to the school system to be established, and approved of the American policy of the separation of the church and state. They chiefly objected to the scheme on the ground that it gave them personal liberty, which they would have, but did not give them political liberty.

SURRENDER ON A SMALL SCALE. Manila, May 23.—6:15 p.m.—Rosaria, a Filipino congressman, wealthy resident of Manila, and formerly Agutayay, accompanied by an insurgent captain, called upon Maj.-Gen. Otis today and announced that "we desire to surrender our persons and property into the hands of the Americans."

According to the story told by Rosaria, Gen. Luna is absolute dictator, and Agutayay fears him. Every Filipino leader, it is added, suspects the others of treachery. The recent meeting of the Filipino congress was to secure a new cabinet, and the question of peace was not considered.

Major Bell, with two companies of the Fourth Cavalry, has been reconnoitering in the direction of Santa Anita. He found 100 Filipinos there, and was driving them away, when large reinforcements of rebels arrived.
