

AGAINST TRANSFER OF THEIR PASTOR

Asklin Street Quarterly Board Want Rev. Alfred Brown to Stay Another Year.

The quarterly official board of the Asklin Street Methodist Church held a meeting last night specially to consider the first draft of stations to be submitted to the London Conference, now meeting at Goderich.

The draft provides for the transfer of Rev. A. K. Birk, of Scarboro, a former pastor of the Colborne Street Church, to Asklin Street, and the removal of Rev. Alfred Brown, the present pastor of Asklin Street, to the First Church, St. Thomas.

Mr. Brown has been at Asklin Street only two years, and the congregation is anxious to have him remain a third year. He has been unanimously requested to do so by the quarterly official board, and has consented, subject, of course, to the action of the stationing committee of the conference.

When the first draft of stations was published, the members of the Asklin Street board were somewhat alarmed to see that Mr. Brown had been slated to go to St. Thomas, and the special meeting of last night was the result.

After considering the matter for two hours, the board instructed its delegates to the conference, Messrs. A. M. Hunt and J. E. Vanstone, to ascertain if it was the intention to put through the draft as drawn up, and if so to advise the other members of the board. Mr. Hunt and Mr. Vanstone left this morning for Goderich. They will sound the stationing committee on the matter, and if it is found that the removal of Mr. Brown is seriously contemplated, it is quite likely that a large deputation will appear before the conference and oppose such action.

Asklin Street Church has prospered under the leadership of Mr. Brown, and it is the desire of all connected with the church to have him stay.

"As far as I am concerned," a member of the board said to "The Advertiser" today, "if the removal of Mr. Brown from Asklin Street became unnecessary, I do not think it is the intention of the stationing committee to remove Mr. Brown."

GREEK JOURNALIST ON TOUR OF WORLD

Visits London and Investigates Condition of Former Fellow-Countrymen.

To investigate the condition of the Greeks in several of the leading countries of the world is the object of a long journey, now being undertaken by Aristotle Chrysanthos, a journalist of Athens.

Mr. Chrysanthos was in the city for a short time yesterday, and left this morning for Niagara Falls. He is representing a syndicate of papers published at Athens, and among the countries already visited are France, Germany, England, Canada and the United States. He is yet to visit Australia, the West Indies and several portions of Africa.

Mr. Chrysanthos told "The Advertiser" that the number of Greeks leaving the home land during the past few years for foreign shores has been so great as to cause some alarm, and the syndicate of Athens papers had assigned him to the task of visiting the several countries named to ascertain from his former fellow-countrymen the cause of their emigration and also their condition. There are at present 4,500 Greeks in Canada and 150,000 in the United States, Mr. Chrysanthos says, and more are coming. Ten thousand left Greece for America in 1905, 15,000 in 1906, and it is expected that the number will reach 20,000 this year.

Mr. Chrysanthos interviews the Greeks wherever he goes, and he makes it a special point to inquire of them if the present system of government in the home land was responsible for their leaving. "If it was," he said, "then we will have to get after the Government and have things righted, so that the people will stay at home."

He finds that the Greeks settled in Canada are very successful, a large number being engaged in business, while not a few have taken up farming. They appear to have more money here, he says, but he is of the opinion that if they had stayed at home and been as industrious as they are in Canada, they would have been as well off. He also declares that the Greeks who have emigrated are not of the better class, the latter remaining at home.

Some of the smaller places in Greece, he says, are experiencing heavy drains on their population, the people either leaving for other countries or going to the larger home cities.

At Hamilton, on Tuesday, Mr. Chrysanthos met Billy Sharpen, winner of the Marathon at Athens a year ago, and spent some time with him. Mr. Chrysanthos was assigned to report the famous race for a Greek newspaper and followed the Canadian a distance of fifteen miles on a bicycle.

"Wherever I go," said Mr. Chrysanthos, "I find that the Greeks have not forgotten the old land, and that if the call came the large majority of them would be ready to return and give her aid. They are very loyal to the land of their birth."

Mr. Chrysanthos has already visited one hundred and fifty cities in Europe and the United States, and he expects to complete his trip in October.

ASSAULTED OLD MAN

George Neil, of London Township, Pays \$5 for Doing So.

George Neil, of London Township, was fined \$5 and costs by Squire Chittick this morning for assaulting James Pomeroy, an aged signalman on the Grand Trunk Railway, on the morning of May 28.

According to the evidence presented, Pomeroy stopped at the Barnes hotel in Pottersburg on the day in question, when he was approached by Neil, who had been standing at the bar drinking.

"What did you say about me?" Neil asked, gruffly, and before the old man could reply it is alleged that Neil struck him in the face. The bartender and some bystanders prevented further trouble, and Pomeroy started on his way to work, remarking as he went out the door, "You'll pay for this Neil, before I am done with you."

Some time later Neil walked down the railroad, past where Pomeroy is employed, and the latter promptly ordered him off the track, whereupon Neil again assaulted him, knocking out one of the old man's teeth.

Pomeroy swore out a warrant and Constable McLoud made the arrest. When the matter was tried in court this morning the complainant pleaded with the magistrate to be lenient with his assailant, and although Squire Chittick admitted that he intended originally to impose a fine of \$10, he reduced the penalty to \$5 and costs, which was paid.

NOT SETTLED YET

Injury of Fireman Gilfoil Likely to Lead to a Lawsuit.

No. 3 committee of the city council, and the manager of the London Street Railway are likely to mix things up. Shanghai, May 30.—The French cruiser Chanzy, which went ashore on one of the Saddle Islands May 20, will prove a total loss, and has been abandoned.

A QUIET SEASON AT CITY HALL

Approaching Visit of Lieutenant-Governor Only Thing Receiving Attention.

Invitations were issued by City Clerk Baker today for the reception to be tendered to Lieutenant-Governor Mortimer Clark on the occasion of his visit to this city on June 5.

Were it not for this visit, there would be scarcely a ripple to stir the stagnant waters of city halldom these days.

The party which will meet the lieutenant-governor will not number more than thirty. It will be composed of the mayor and aldermen, the chairman of the different civic bodies, the chairman of the board of education, etc.

The route decided upon by the committee, and the public places which will be visited, have apparently met with approval on all sides, for as yet there have been no changes suggested.

While the mayor and aldermen are busily engaged on the working out of the details of the visit mentioned above, nothing else stirs around the city hall.

Grand Trunk track elevation is by common consent now declared to be a matter which will be dealt with late in the year, if not dealt with at all by the council of 1907.

Third Vice-President Fitzhugh promised some time ago to give the city an early answer in regard to the draft agreement sent to the company, but apparently Mr. Fitzhugh is somewhat busy. At all events he hasn't had time to answer the letter thus far.

The proposed purchase of the London Street Railway by the city has dropped out of sight.

The mayor has dropped it. Chairman Beattie has dropped it, and well, there was nobody else to drop it.

Not a word is said about the city having somebody go through the company's books and also place an estimate on the value of the system.

This was what President Everett suggested when he met the city's representatives some time ago.

But there is nothing doing.

The street watering problem has quieted down.

Ald. Gillean, chairman of No. 3 committee, is seconding the motion necessary to water the streets from the hydrants, the same as in days of yore.

There may be a rumour later on, when the dry weather sets in, but no one anticipates any more trouble in this regard than London has been accustomed to for some years back.

From the fact that the formal complaints are being made at the city hall, it would appear that the street watering is being done very satisfactorily this year, despite the prophecies indulged in that the city could not do the work properly.

Samples of water taken from wells in the vicinity of the McGregor well on the base line, have been sent to the Provincial Board of Health. It is the belief of the men behind the syndicate that the water is pure, and the water commissioners have determined to test all the wells in the neighborhood in an endeavor to ascertain how it is that the water of the McGregor well is impure.

The well on the Carling farm on Dundas street east is now flowing about 30,000 gallons a day, and Supt. Moore is very much interested in it.

Samples of this water, and also samples from the show case well, have been sent to the Provincial Board of Health, and as soon as the results of the analyses are made known, the water will, if the results are satisfactory, be pumped into the city mains.

Chairman Scretion of the Hospital Trust, stated today that the isolation hospital scheme is being delayed because the Provincial Board of Health has as yet failed to approve the site on Ottawa avenue, decided upon by the city and the trust.

No trouble is looked for, but the board is evidently very busy, and has not had time to take up the matter.

WANTS IMPROVEMENTS

Ald. Rose Interviews City Engineer Regarding the East End.

Ald. Rose had an interview today with City Engineer Graydon in regard to some badly needed improvements in the east end.

The alderman is devoting his attention at present to works in the south-east end, which he feels have been neglected by the board of works in the past.

He objects to the placing of pit gravel on the streets and insists that only river gravel be used. The latter, once it is packed, makes a first class roadway.

PROF. CHANDLER DEAD

Noted Professor of McGill University Succumbs to Heart Disease.

Montreal, May 29.—Professor George Henry Chandler, M.A., professor of applied mathematics of McGill University, died at his residence, 32 Lorne avenue, early this morning, at the age of 53. Deceased had been in good health for some time, but the end came very suddenly today from heart disease. Born at Bromfield, P. Q., in 1854, he was educated at McGill University, becoming a B. A. and gold medalist in mathematics and physics in 1875, and M. A. in 1879. Afterwards he went to Cambridge University, England, to specially study mathematics. On the foundation of the faculty of applied science at McGill in 1878 it was felt that no better choice could be made for the chair of practical mathematics, and he was appointed.

The "Society of Assurance for Widows and Orphans" was the first known insurance company, and was established in London in 1695.

Detroit, Mich., May 30.—Sheldon W. Brown, assistant-general superintendent of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Railway, with headquarters at Cleveland, has been named as the successor to H. C. HENSALL HOTEL AFIRE
The Unoccupied Queen's Hostelry Ablaze Early Today.

Hensall, May 30.—Some days ago Queen's hostelry, who owned the Queen's Hotel served a notice on the council to have the local option bylaw quashed. The case was to have been heard at Toronto on the 23rd, but the case was adjourned, so that Reeve, Geiger, Clerk Stoneman, Rev. Mr. Toll and Mr. Coxworth could be examined under oath at Goderich on Monday last, when some of the charges were dropped.

The Commercial House is being run as a temperance house and an additional sample room has been provided. The sale of intoxicating liquors has ceased.

Hensall, May 30.—This morning about 1:45, the cry of "fire" aroused the village and it was found that the Queen's Hotel was ablaze. Fortunately it is on a corner and detached, and was vacated about two years ago. The light wind was blowing the sparks over the G. T. R. yard, so that it was not a hard task to save the barn and shed. Mr. T. Murdoch's livery, on the other side of the street, was next and he had all his rigs out.

Local option came in force here on May 1, and Mr. Bice, who had a lease of the hotel till November, 1908, had a sale, and moved out. Since that time it has not been occupied.
