UNION OF ENGLAND AND UNITED STATES WILL END TYRANNY

Mighty League Will Enthroned Liberty for Whole World.

Rev. Dr. Silcox preaching at the First Congregational Church last evening on "The Anglo-American Alliance," said in part:

There are people in London today of the same ilk as the Pharisees and Sadducees. These people instead of learning about the heavenly life from the teachings of Jesus run after mediums, seances, clairvoyants, spirits, spooks and things of that kind. They put more emphasis on some table-rapping affair or the unintelligible mutterings of some female medium in a darkened room, than in the plain teachings of Jesus and the apostles. They are weather-wise, but ignorant, not able to understand or read the signs of the times. They could understand what their religious duty is by understanding the movements of God in human events, and putting themselves in right relation to them. God is revealed in nature and in His holy word.

But He may be seen also in the events of life, the rise and fall of nations up to a higher conception of nationhood.

Divine Guidance.
To all who read the history of England and the hand of God in the deliverance from the hand of Spain, more by the might of God than the power of man, in these words, written on the monument: "Thou didst blow with thy wind; the sea covered them."

No nation has been so guided, led and protected as England. What we need to emphasize is that we shall honor God in these marvellous events transpiring around us.

Men are called on to do clear Christian thinking as never before. High statesmanship is needed as never before in the history of nations. These are great days to live in. Better five years today than 500 of Methuselah's years. I congratulate every soldier in this time when God is shaking the nations—shaking thrones and old efforts of ideas of government, that He might bring in a better day when peace shall find her ancient splendours over all the earth. Are we clear-visioned enough to discern the signs of the time? It is difficult to grasp the full significance

of all the events since August, 1914. Marvellous changes—moral upheavals, political regenerations, social transformations as no people on this planet ever saw since time began.

Russia Rejected.

It is the uprising—as Lord Curzon said—of the conscience of the world to put an end to the rule of Satan on this earth.

We may all be proud to live in these days and have some part in this regenerating work, in the struggle for the great commonwealth of mankind—and the freeing of mankind.

LACK OF INTEREST IN CHURCH SCHOOLS BECOMING SERIOUS

Less Than Half Children Baptized Come Into Full Communion.

The fact that more than half the children baptized in the Presbyterian church in Canada fail to come into full communion was emphasized by Rev. W. J. Knox in his evening sermon at the First Presbyterian Church as one of the most serious notes struck in his report presented at the general assembly in Montreal. Of 18,000 children baptized only 7,000 became full communicants. Knox said, was caused by the fact that little interest was taken in the work of the church and because of the failure to direct the steps of the young in the right direction. If in this line the church did not take the question bodily and intelligently it was bound to go along with every other one. It was up to the parents and teachers he said, to become more in earnest for unless the church was awakened to the situation its whole life would be weakened. Its members were too wonted to trifle with the problem. They should realize that it was utterly folly to be blind to the fundamental importance of this work.

Evidence of Power.
Delegates to the assembly had been struck by the evidence of the power possessed by the Roman Catholic Church in Montreal. Its strength, he asserted, was due to the zealous manner in which it guarded and trained its children. Because it cherished this work as one of the greatest importance it was strong today.

Failure of the young members of the Presbyterian Church to receive training in the fundamentals of their belief resulted in weakness before the power of other churches and a consequent drifting away from their own. His sermon threw a number of interesting sidelights on the assembly. Dealing with foreign missions, he stated that the work had progressed well, although the war was affecting most fields. Its influence was being felt particularly in China, from whence thousands of the natives were being taken through Canada to work in the munition factories of France. He asserted that he had seen between sixteen and eighteen carloads of the Oriental workmen near Montreal preparing to embark at one of the Atlantic ports.

Many Missionaries.
Missionaries, he said, were going with each contingent of workers as it was felt that these men, far from their homes, would offer an excellent field in which to sow the seeds of the Christian doctrine. Fifteen workers had already been withdrawn from North Hanan to carry on this work, leaving only two male missionaries in that part of the country.

Home mission work had been promoted with the greatest difficulty because of the scarcity of men. The majority of these in the past year had come from colleges in the United States because the institutions here had been depleted of students to the number of 270. All these men were in khaki.

One of the problems presented by this field was the "grek" of the churches in the more populous cities from the congested portions of the municipalities into the newer residential sections. This situation had been counteracted in a few cities by the establishment of settlement homes and missions.

A striking feature of the assembly, he said, was the fine spirit of reconciliation and compromise not only in the matter of church union, but in other lines.

REV. A. J. THOMAS' FAREWELL SERMON AT DUNDAS CENTRE

Popular Pastor Will Leave This Week for Peterboro Charge.

After a pastorate of three years, Rev. A. J. Thomas preached his farewell sermon last evening in Dundas Centre Methodist Church, previous to leaving for his new charge at Peterboro. His final sermon as minister was a tribute to "the glorious gospel of Christ" and a declaration of his faith and love for Jesus, the centre of the gospel.

In his eighteen years of preaching the gospel, said Mr. Thomas, "Jesus has been my life, my joy, my strength and my hope. I have felt like giving up the ministry, but I could not give up the opportunity of preaching the gospel message. I plead with you tonight to cling to the Jesus of the gospel, for you lose all else. In leaving London I feel that I have not done all I could have done for the unsaved of this city. My heart is sad because of neglected opportunities, for souls that have perished because of what I have left undone. I plead with you as if I would never see you or preach to you again to accept this Jesus of the glorious gospel."

Many Reasons.
The reasons for which the preacher called attention to the "gloriousness of the gospel" were as follows: (1) because of the person of whom it speaks; (2) because of what it has accomplished; (3) because of the love which it reveals; (4) because of the results achieved by the love of Jesus; (5) because of the task which it imposes; (6) because of the glorious hope which it inspires.

Bidding good-bye, Mr. Thomas expressed his warm gratitude and that of Mrs. Thomas to the congregation for

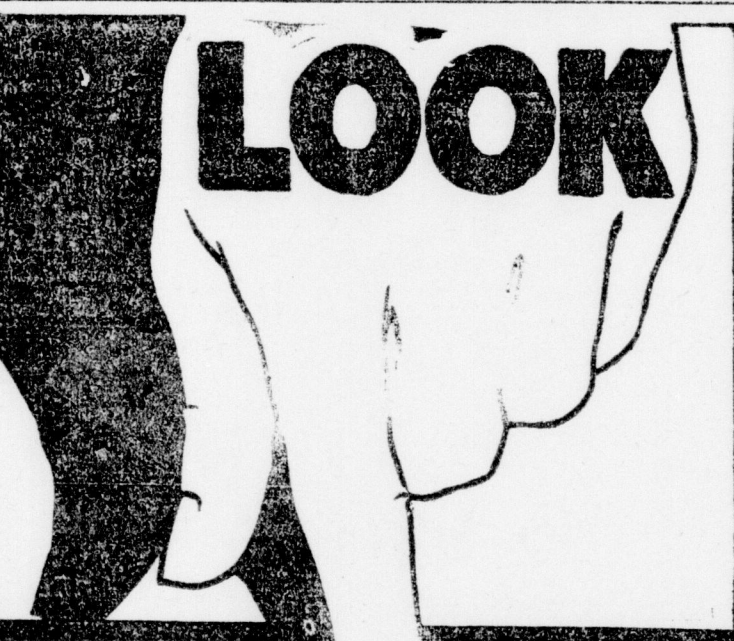

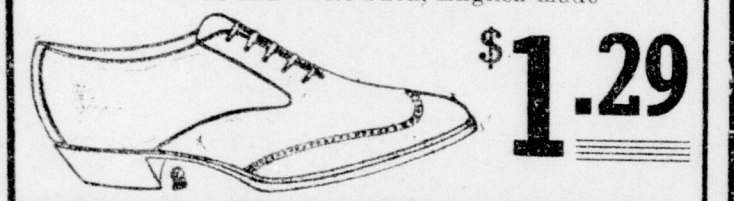

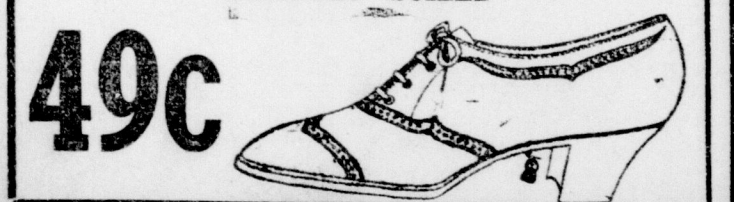
