PROPOSES TO PROSECUTE ENEMIES AFTER THE WAR

French Deputy Moves to Establish Special High Court.

PARIS, March 23.—A resolution proposing that the Entente Allies establish a high court of justice to judge those responsible for all crime and criminal attempts committed by the members of the Entente during the war, was introduced in the Chamber of Deputies today by Edouard Ignace of the department of the Seine. The resolution says that the Germans are systematically disregarding the law of nations, that atrocities are increasing and that the German nation is tolerating silently the misdeeds perpetrated in its name as an accomplice and assumes all responsibility.

SOCIALISTS OF NEW YORK DECLARE FOR WAR; BETTER BLOODSHED THAN BONDAGE

NEW YORK, March 23.—Several prominent Socialists met here today, and after protesting against the action of the party's executive committee in issuing a manifesto "purporting to express the party's position about the threatened war between the United States and Germany," passed resolutions endorsing President Wilson's course, and pledging their support to the country.

"To refuse to resist international crime is to be unworthy of the name of Socialist," the resolution said. "It is our present duty to the cause of internationalism to support our Government in any sacrifice it requires in defence of the principles of international law and order, which are essential alike to Socialism and civilization."

"We are for peace, but not at any cost, and believe that the sacrifice of integrity and of general public and private self-respect is too high a price to pay for it. We abhor bloodshed, but see clearly that blood had better be shed than saved by cowardice to decay in bondage."

Germans Preparing to Deport Youth of Occupied Zone

Will Force Young Men and Women To Do Farming.

HAZEBROUCK, France, March 23.—It is reported here that deportations from the invaded district of northern France are about to be resumed. The Germans for some time are said to have been distributing blankets to be filled out, in order to organize the deportation of young men and women with a view to employing them for spring farming.

The Germans continue to requisition spital, having taken from most of the churches in Lille their bells and organ pipes and from other places quantities of sheet steel.

VIOLENT BATTLE TO NORTH OF MONASTIR A FRENCH VICTORY

Repeated Attacks by Germans and Bulgars Beaten.

PARIS, March 23.—"Violent engagements have taken place to the north of Monastir (Serbia) for the possession of Hill 1245, which ultimately remained in our hands, despite repeated attacks by the Germans and Bulgarians," says the French war office statement covering Macedonia tonight.

"As a whole, including the figures given in the preceding communication, we had captured in this region up to March 21, eleven machine guns, two trench guns, twenty-four officers and 1,770 men. During the same period three enemy aeroplanes were brought down by the British whose very active operations have also bombarded railway stations and enemy artillery parks. Following operations, made necessary by the exactions of Greek insurgent bands in the neutral zone have enabled us to scatter several bands in the region of Kifissos and to seize a great number of rifles and cartridges which had been concealed."

Britain Tightens Blockade Around Great Naval Base

WASHINGTON, March 23.—An extension of the area of danger to shipping off the mouths of the Weser and Elbe Rivers, where the Allies are employing mines and other devices in their effort to block access from the great German naval base, is announced in a British foreign office note cabled to the state department today by Ambassador Page.

The line, formerly running from a point four miles off the Danish coast to within seven miles of the Dutch coast, after April 1 will extend between points three miles off the Danish and Dutch coasts and include all waters to the eastward except the territorial waters of these countries. Beginning on the parallel of latitude 56 degrees north of Jutland the line passes through latitude 56 degrees north, longitude six degrees east, latitude 54 degrees 40 minutes north, longitude 4 degrees 20 minutes east, latitude 53 degrees 23 minutes north, longitude 5 degrees 15 minutes east, latitude 53 degrees 52 minutes north, and thence to the eastward following Netherlands territorial waters.

NEW POWER COMPANY. OTTAWA, March 23.—The Fort Frances and English River Railway Company will apply to Parliament for incorporation and for power to construct a line from Fort Frances to Kenora.

PALMER'S ADVICE TO U.S. IS GO SLOW ON TROOPS FOR FRANCE

Ten Thousand Men Would Do Little Good.

GET PROPER ARMY FIRST

Says Civilian Should Be Chief Censor, With Officers Assisting Him.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 23.—Frederick Palmer, veteran war correspondent, who was the only accredited American correspondent on the western front for nearly two years, delivered a confidential talk here today at the army war college to the general staff and many officers detailed there. Mr. Palmer detailed to the army officers many things which he has not been at liberty to publish—principally of military value to the United States. Some of the things the correspondent told the army officers were permitted to become public, and among them was his declaration that the United States should not attempt to send any troops to France until it has raised an army of proper proportions. Ten thousand men, he said, would do little more than hold a mile of trench.

On the subject of censorship in the event of the United States entering the war, Mr. Palmer counselled the appointment of a chief civilian censor with army and navy officers for assistants and the publication of all possible details in connection with the army. Inasmuch as an army must be recruited from the people, he told the officers, the people must be given information which would not be of military value to an enemy.

GERMANY CUTS BREAD RATION DOWN; PAPERS CALL IT "UNBEARABLE"

Industrial Population Suffering Greatly.

AMSTERDAM, March 23.—Via London.—The bread ration in Germany will be diminished one-fourth beginning April 15, owing to the scarcity of wheat, according to a dispatch from Berlin in the Weser Zeitung of yesterday. The potato ration will be continued at five pounds weekly, and the meat ration will be increased by 250 grams weekly. It is announced, adds the dispatch, that the curtailment in the use of wheat is necessary to insure the present stocks lasting until the next harvest. The announcement of the bread reduction has caused surprise and consternation in Germany. The Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung says: "The reduction is a very painful surprise."

Endurance Will Be Rewarded. The Cologne Volks Zeitung reproduces a semi-official statement which contains the following: "It should not be concealed that this new restriction means a great sacrifice, and can only be borne by a people who for the sake of the highest aims will bear even a heavy burden, and who have a firm confidence that their patient endurance will be rewarded before long by a glorious peace."

The Volks Zeitung says editorially: "If the measure is absolutely necessary it must be accepted, but it must be stated that for many the limits of the bearable are thereby exceeded. The grounds advanced for the measure are not adequate. Even now it is only with great deprivations that the industrial populations of the towns manage with the bread rations."

SHOWS FOOD CRISIS. COPENHAGEN, via London, March 23.—The announcement of a reduction in the bread ration of Germany and an increase in the meat ration, as received here, is indicative of Germany's present food difficulties, to which the Prussian food commissioner, Dr. George Michaelis, referred in a recent speech in the Prussian Diet.

The grain stocks, which, even with the supplies received from Rumania, were barely sufficient to carry through the population until the harvest, at the old ration, had to be drawn upon to compensate for the potato crisis in the winter, when for weeks the supplies to the cities were interrupted owing to the intensely cold weather.

Reduction in Potatoes. The "restoration" of the potato ration to five pounds is really a reduction, when it is considered that the ration in the autumn was seven pounds. Then for weeks the actual ration of three pounds was unobtainable by a large part of the population, Hamburg, for instance, serving it only at occasional intervals.

The meat ration, on the other hand, can be increased, owing to the comparatively large stocks of cattle which have accumulated, and which must be slaughtered owing to the shortage of fodder.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY

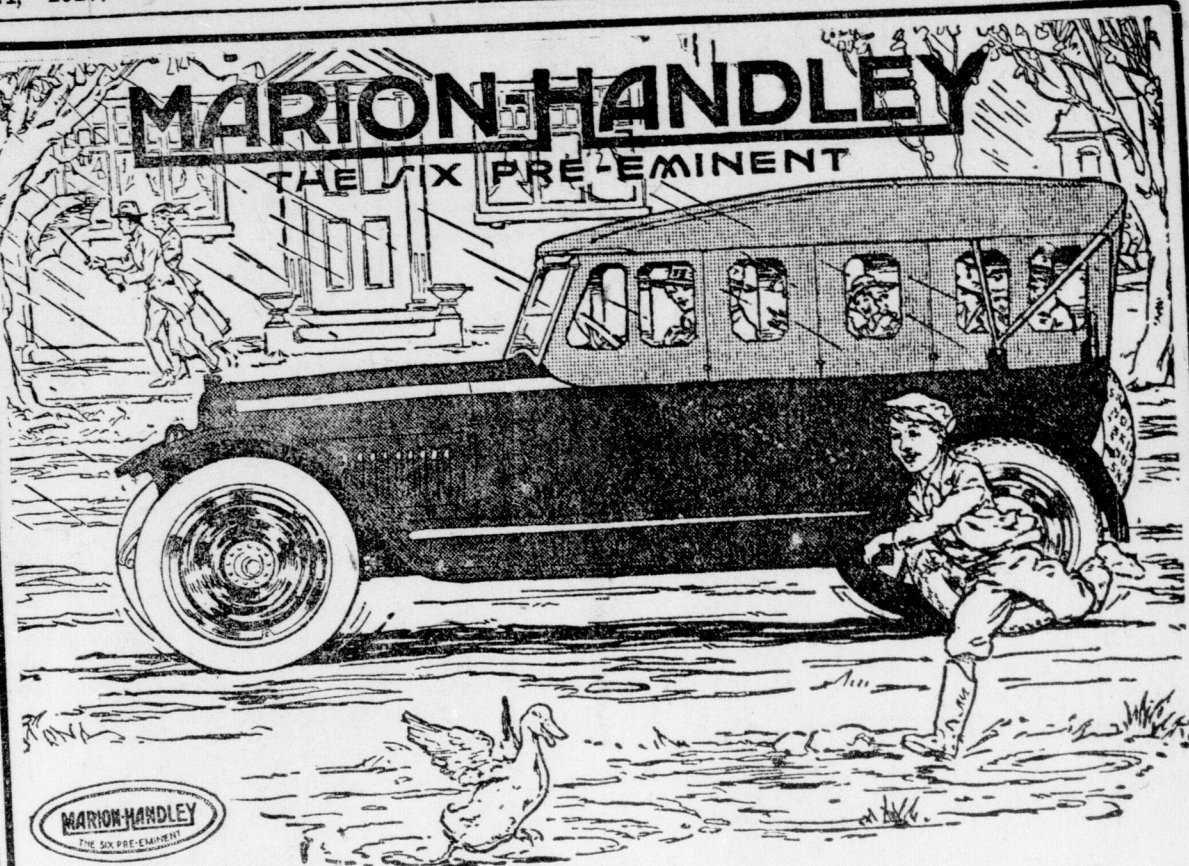
Prominent Dorchester Man Who Died Suddenly Buried Friday.

Dorchester, March 23.—The funeral of W. Henry Shaw was held this afternoon from the Methodist Church to the Union Cemetery, and was in charge of the Rev. Messrs. Rivers and Yeale conducted the service, which was largely attended. Mr. Shaw, although in his 71st year, had always been remarkably active, and his sudden death, which occurred while he was seated in his chair in conversation with a neighbor, caused a shock to his many friends.

Mr. Shaw was clerk of the division court, an Oddfellow and a Mason, and six members of Canton London, No. 1, P. M., acted as pall-bearers. Besides his wife and one son, Reginald of Detroit, he is survived by five brothers, Lyman and James of Dorchester, Sidney of Detroit, John and David of London, and one sister, Mrs. Copeland of Thessalon.

The floral tributes were numerous, many being from outside friends, and included a pillow from Merrill Masonic Lodge, a spray and wreath from the teachers and pupils of the public school Oddfellow, Rev. Messrs. Rivers and a wreath from London Oddfellow, and Gates Ajar from the family.

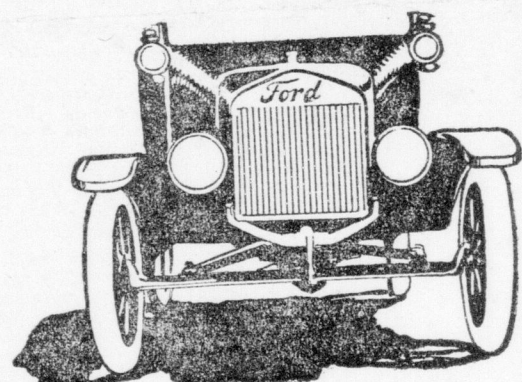

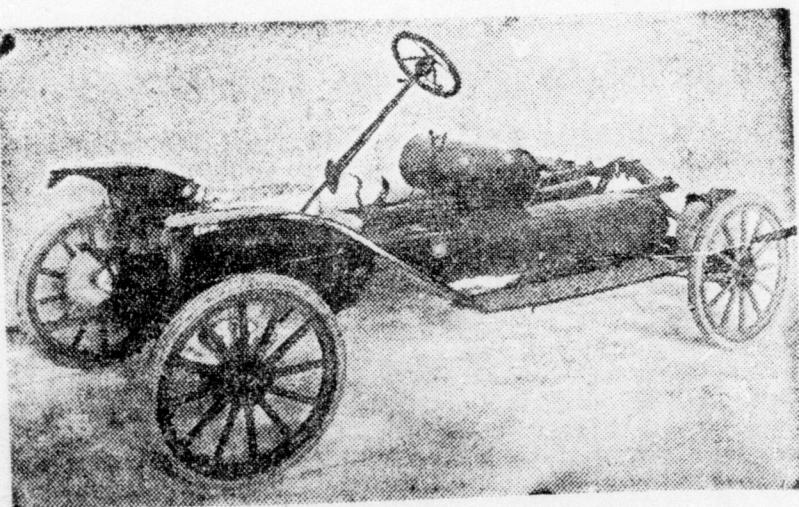
