FATHER LAURENDEAU IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Former London Priest in Hospital With Sleeping Sickness.

WINDSOR, Jan. 3.—Rev. Father F. N. Laurendeau, pastor of the Lady of the Lake Church, Ford, is in Hotel Dieu, seriously ill with sleeping sickness.

Rev. Father Joseph Gerard, Windsor, is also ill with the same disease in Hotel Dieu, but is improving.

Reports stating that Rev. Father T. V. Moylan, C.S.B., principal and vice-president of Assumption College, Sandwich, died from illness, diagnosed as sleeping sickness, in a Detroit hospital yesterday, were denied by professors of the college this morning.

Father Moylan has been ill for several weeks, and about ten days ago was removed to Harper Hospital, Detroit. He has been connected with Assumption College since his ordination about 15 years ago. He was president of St. Thomas College, Waco, Texas, for a year.

HOUSING COMMISSION HAS ITS TROUBLES

Geo. Wood Threatens Legal Proceedings Unless Agreement Kept.

While the housing commission has been proceeding quietly with its work for the past two years it has more than once been the victim of the citizens who purchased houses at the commission's sale.

This is Mr. George Wood, 325 Salisbury street, who has threatened legal proceedings against the commission, claiming that the commission has failed to carry out its agreement with him for a 100-year lease on a 100-year house, which he now occupies.

The solicitor states that: "Mr. Wood complains that for months before he went into possession of the house under the written undertaking an attempt had been made to obtain \$300 more from him than he agreed to pay the commission, and that the contractor told him that unless he came over with the money the house would not be finished and that the commission has not completed the house."

Mr. Wood states amongst other things that your contract calls for No. 1 Milton pressed brick, whilst an inferior quality of another make has been used, and the bricks under the roof are loose and without mortar. The gables are not shingled with asphalt, as specified nor is the shingling laid close, and joints are visible. The roof is covered with either building paper or asbestos, and the water comes through with every rain.

"One window sash in the front room is too small; one in the dining-room is fitted not hung with weights, and one light of glass in the cellar window was broken before he occupied the house."

"The glass put in the front door is plain glass instead of beveled plate glass, and the side and end one-quarter inches thick instead of one and three-fourth inches. There are no keys for the front door, and one for each of the other outside doors, instead of two each. The coalbin is built of old kiln-dried lumber. Instead of good two-inch dressed lumber."

"The rain comes through around the windows on the night side during every storm, and the walls are wet for days afterwards some of them are now wet."

Mr. George Wood states that he gave you notice that unless the building is completed within a certain time, he would make for the damages he has sustained, he will be compelled to take proceedings."

CHILDREN OF LONDON TWO HOODLUPS DEPOSIT \$14,216.65 IN THE PENNY BANK

Stand Third in List of Report for Year Just Issued.

London stands third in the list of cities whose school children deposit money with the Penny Bank, according to the directors' report and financial statement for the year ended June 30, 1920, which has just been issued. City children deposited \$14,216.65.

Toronto led the list with a deposit of \$356,753, while Ottawa was next with \$37,543. The total deposits for the Dominion increased from \$502,549.64 in 1919, an increase of \$103,839 or more than twelve per cent.

The directors attribute this success to the loyal spirit of co-operation that exists between school teachers, bank clerks and the education authorities. They maintain that the bank ought to be operating in every school in every centre in Ontario, and that an organized effort in this direction may be attempted soon.

A. TORY PRESENTED WITH PURSE OF GOLD

G. T. R. Official Has Been in Railroad Work Since 1874.

After 46 years' railroad service, A. T. G. T. R. Official has been in railroad work since 1874.

Tory, Grand Trunk Railway stockholder in London, has retired, and last night was presented with a purse of gold by the staff of the stores and car works office.

After speeches had been made by C. Forrester (superintendent), I. N. Clark (master car builder), Henry Farnam, G. Fisher, F. A. Rutherford, W. Tichborne and George H. Allen, Mr. Tory replied:

"I thank you all from the bottom of my heart," he said. "In the many years that I have been connected with the stores department, I have seen many changes, both in the car department and also in the shops. Many foremen who were with me when I came have passed away. Others have taken their places. Several changes have occurred in my own department. Quite a number have also passed away. I don't know that I can say any more to you than to thank you for the very efficient help that I have had from you at all times, not only from my own staff, but from those connected with the car department, especially the handling of materials."

G. W. Wainwright made the presentation and I. N. Clark acted as chairman. Mr. Tory entered the offices of the Great Northwestern Railway on February 9, 1874. He went to Montreal at the time of the fusion of the Great Northwestern and the Grand Trunk in August, 1882. He was with the general accountant, and assisted in making the North-Western Railway. Later he transferred to Hamilton as foreman of the car department, and later was promoted to be a divisional stockkeeper for Ontario lines, but at the same time retained the position of general accountant.

This latter position he held until two years ago, when the plant was closed.

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS ARE BACK AT WORK

University Halls Are Again Crowded.

EXAMINATIONS ON SOON

Much Burning of Midnight Oil—Social Functions Barred.

There was a good muster of students at the Western University today after the Christmas vacation. The mid-year examinations take place in three weeks, and from now until these important events, there will be a period of hard work. All social functions are barred and the midnight oil and damp towels will be in evidence until the pinnacle of efficiency has been attained.

There are 54 students on the register, all told, including the faculties of medicine, public health and arts, but the adverse conditions of the summer school will add 50 or more.

The department of war trophies, Ottawa, has been notified that the Western has just received as its share a German 10-millimetre gun and carriage complete. This grim reminder of the great war has been given a temporary position near the main entrance.

MOORHEAD OUTLINES COMMITTEE PROGRAM

Gravel Roads Will Receive Immediate Attention, He States.

Ald. C. G. Moorhead, who probably will be chairman of No. 2 committee this year, today outlined some of the work likely to be taken up by that body after its formation on Monday.

Attention will be given at once to streets on which work has been held back because of the paving contract. He declared. A number of gravel roads have been petitioned for some years, and it is only fair to the people, he said, and to the whole city that the work should be undertaken now.

Another important matter will be the readjustment of sewer charges, which, he claims, are excessive, owing to the work being done in the winter. The court of revision has ruled that the additional cost must be borne by the general ratepayers. Adjustment of charges for street lighting will be another task.

The man who went over to Europe immediately at the close of the war to re-establish Canadian trade across the seas and whose work in that respect earned him the praise of business everywhere in Canada, is to be the special guest of the London Canadian Club at their annual dinner on Friday night of this week at the Tenthon House.

Mr. Lloyd Harris has had a remarkable business career, particularly on the west coast of Europe. Before going to Europe he was connected with the Canadian trade mission at Washington, and prior to that he had been a resident in London, England, at various times.

He was recently appointed a member of the Dominion Advisory Council for Industrial Scientific Research, and is taking an active part in the work of this body, which is so closely connected with the development of the resources of the Dominion.

London as a city, he said, is on the edge of a great industrial advance. The opportunity to hear Mr. Harris, a man that should not be missed, and the Canadian Club is making it possible for every business man in London who desires to do so to hear him.

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TWO HOODLUPS AND BURGLARY OVERNIGHT

"What Has Police Commission Done to Protect Us," Ask Citizens.

With the reporting today of two hoodlups of individuals and of the burglarizing of the cigar store and poolroom of D. Cusolito, 74 1/2 Dundas street, citizens are asking "what has the police commission done to assure us the protection due to us as ratepayers and citizens?"

The two hoodlups, which took place between 11 p.m. and midnight last night, were both pulled off by the bandits within a block or two of each other, one on Nelson street and the other on John street, while the burglarized store may almost be said to be in the same district, being located on Dundas, between Talbot and Eldon streets. Residents in this section also call to mind that Rudy's bakery store, 20 1/2 Dundas street, was the scene of a daring holdup on Christmas eve shortly before midnight, when nearly \$100 was secured by the masked thieves, who made their getaway in an automobile after firing a shot to scare off pursuit.

In none of their attempts at securing easy money have the hoodlups been successful in making any large hauls, the holdup of the two individuals only netting them \$22, while Cusolito's tobacco store the till only yielded 65 cents in cash, but the visitors, who had gained entrance by breaking a pane of glass in the front door and then pulling back the door latch, apparently filled their pockets with choice late bars, cigarettes and cigars valued at about \$10. The police were the first to know of the burglary, the glass being discovered when the constable on the beat was trying the store doors, and Mr. Cusolito was notified about 2 o'clock this morning.
