United Kingdom—Rains have failen during the week, which is interrupting the harvesting of wheat.

France—Weather is very favorable for harvesting, and merchants are more hopeful owing to the favorable weather attending harvest, and there is a tendency to raise estimates regarding the yield.

Germany—Weather is favorable and prospects for a good crop maintained; offerings of new wheat increasing.

Hungary—There are liberal offerings of sew wheat, which are being well absorbed.

Roumania—Weather continues favorable. Roumania—Weather able.
