"The new Western Hospital will be the finest in Canada for the purposes it will serve," said Dr. John Ferguson to The World yesterday, "and it will be the most practical. Nothing that should be in it will be left out? Very few, only two or three, in the United

its purpose.

It will be 333 feet 8 inches long, parallel with and facing Bathurst-street, and 90 feet from the road. The building now there will be left for the present and the addition will be in front of it. In width it will be 36 feet. The control or administrative portion will be a little wider, with an extra storey, which will be used as the caretaker's apartments and storerooms. The present building will be connected by a passage which will be used as a "sun room" for convalescent patients. The north wing of the basement will be for out-patients and will be equipped with an emergency ward. The north wing will be for male patients and the south for female. The heating apparatus will change the air thruout the whole structure every 15 minutes.

NEW YORK, July 14 .- (Special) .-Following an investigation of an immigrant uprising on Ellis Island yesterday, a case came to light of the deportation on June 20 of Johann Wirzy, an immigrant boy who arrived here on the Hamburg-American liner Cleveland, bound for Saskatchewan, Canada, for which country he had a direct ticket.
