### TO FINANCE TRADING WITH BALTIC PROVINCES

London, Feb. 4.—The plan for financing trading with Esthonia, Letvia and Lithuania, as worked out January 7, has received the government's sanction, and now, will be put into

The plan, it is asserted, provides for the establishment in each of the countries, in partnership with the government bank, of a bank generally modeled after the Bank of England which provides for a new issue of currency based on a gold standard, and the restoration of debased currency by a sound and scientific process of currency reform.
