

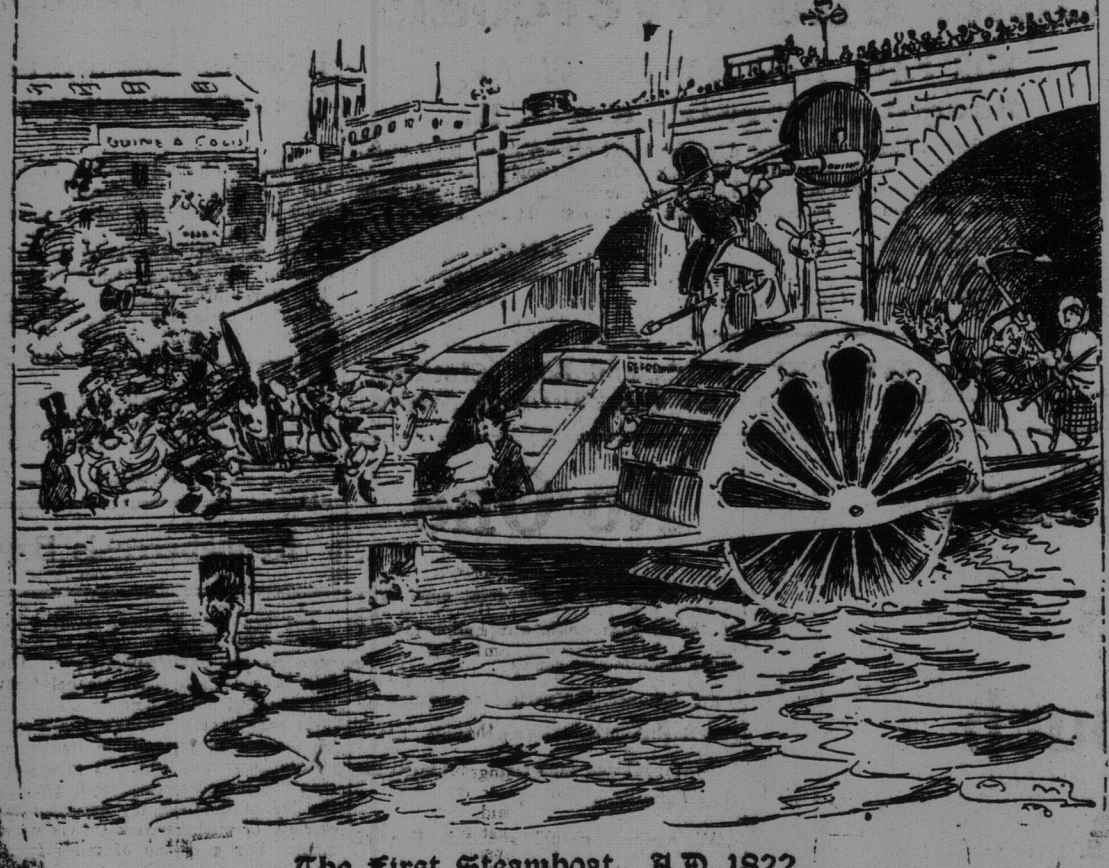

Philadelphia Teamsters are rapidly building up the membership of their union.

Members of the locals under the jurisdiction of the Organizers' International Union, are voting on a proposition submitted by their general executive board to levy a per capita tax of 25c.

The executive committee of the Trades Labor Congress of Canada in its recent meeting at the annual meeting in Toronto recently, shows a considerable increase in membership, and called for a number of changes in existing laws with a view to making them more favorable to workingmen.

Organizers for the United Mine Workers are busy in the Irwin, Pa., field, establishing local unions. They say there are 10,000 unorganized men in the Irwin field, and that they have been more successful in getting the men into line during the last few weeks than at any time since the region became non-union, twelve years ago.

burg convention will take a pronounced position Mongolian labor, including Chinese, Japanese and Koreans, and will insist on rigid exclusion.

Announcement is made that a general meeting of all the bituminous operators of the country will be held in Chicago November 22, in respect to what attitude they will take in connection with the proposed new law.

It is reported that President Roosevelt will recommend to congress the passage of an act requiring the re-registration of all Chinese now in the United States, and the negotiation of a treaty with Mexico providing for the better enforcement of the Chinese Exclusion Act.

Before 8000 miners at Tampana, Pa., John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers of America, declared that upon the expiration of the present wage agreement, on April 1, 1906, the miners' union will demand unequal recognition of the union and an eight-hour day.

According to a West Australian paper the amalgamation of the two big gold-mining unions, the A. W. A. and the A.M.A., is on the eve of accomplishment. The new union will be called the West Australian Miners' Federation of Workers, and will probably start with a membership of at least 5,000.

The report of the Antwerp Sailors' Home (Zeevaanhuys) for the year 1904 states that in the course of the twelve months the establishment was visited by 1,347 seamen, and the average number of boarders per day was 32.

Eight hundred women, the wives of unemployed workers, met on the Titanic embankment, London, recently, and sent a deputation to the Prime Minister and the Opposition leader, to urge them to pass the Unemployed Workers Bill.

The New York Trousers Makers Union has struck for an advance of wages, a ten-hour workday and recognition of the union. There are 800 trouser makers out in 250 shops. The Children's Jacket Makers' Union, which has a membership of 2000, has ordered a general strike to go into effect for higher wages and recognition of the union.

The inmates of the New Jersey State prison have stopped making mail bags, because of the law prohibiting the use of convict labor on government contracts.

Delegates representing 30,000 mine workers of the Schuylkill district met at Lehigh, Pa., recently in annual convention, passed resolutions embodying the demands which they desire to have made when the present agreement expires. These are to include an eight hour day and recognition of the union demands, which the convention of miners in the upper and middle coal fields also adopted.

A strike by the Mattress Makers' Union for a ten per cent. increase in wages is now in progress in New York city. Forty-five shops, employing 500 men and women, are affected.

It is reported that all the leading breweries of the country have agreed to a reduction of the working hours of their employees from nine to eight in consideration of the men waving the right to free beer more than twice a day.
