"We saw the French Algerian troops giving way before the gases. We took up a position at six o'clock with eight machine guns. The Germans came at us and we simply mowed them down. They fell back before our withering fire. "Next morning we went into action with the famous Buffs, an Imperial regiment. We inflicted great losses on the Bosches. We then moved over to give some support to the 7th Battalion. Every man in our section, except one, was on the casualty list next day. One of our sergeants got the V. C. and the other won the Russian Cross of St. George. I got a bullet in the foot.

"You would not believe me if I told you all I saw in that engagement. I had twelve bulletholes in my great coat and one of my boots was slashed right across the top by a bullet. It was certainly a great time. We lost our colonel that day and over 1,000 out of 1,200 men.

Sunday, Nov. 15, 1915.

Dear Mother:—
Your letter received and was glad to get it as usual. I was very unlucky the other day as I took my laundry to a farm house where I knew the people, and about half an hour later the Germans shelled the place and blew it to pleces, so you can send me some socks as soon as possible; I have a couple of pairs, but they won't last any too long. I saw the laundry blown down. In fact, I wasn't fifty yards away with three others and when we went to the place after the shooting we found the old man and woman killed and the daughter was almost dead, she had both legs and a hand blown off beside one breast and part of her face; she died the next day in the hospital. It was the worst sight I have seen since I came over, and we knew the people well too. One of the fellows who was with us at the time of the shooting was wounded and is in England now. I have a bit of shell that hit me on the foot, but of course it never even marked the shoe.


