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

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PETER CLINCH IS HONORED BY UNDERWRITERS

Receives Club Bag on Retirement After 47 Years as Secretary

A pleasing function took place yesterday afternoon in the N. B. Board of Fire Underwriters' rooms here, a special meeting of the board having been called for the purpose of saying farewell to Peter Clinch, who is today retiring as secretary of the board, following a service of 47 years. Mr. Clinch was made the recipient of a handsome club bag, presented to him by W. H. White, on behalf of the board. G. O. D. Otty also made a short address. Captain J. E. Masters, of Moncton, a visitor at the meeting, made a few remarks, as did also J. Cecil Mitchell, the new secretary. Mr. Clinch replied in a fitting manner.

Interviewed in his office Mr. Clinch was in a reminiscent mood and traced the changes that have taken place in the insurance field in the past half century as well as in the city and province life. Although he has rounded out nearly the allotted span of three score and ten years, Mr. Clinch is still a hearty man and looks much younger than his age. He still possesses a boyish vigor and vitality so few people of his age retain.

REMEMBERS GREAT FIRE

"I remember," he said, "distinctly the great fire of 1877, when the business district of Saint John was practically wiped out. Insurance following to the amount of \$6,250,000 were paid out by insurance companies at that time and you must remember that there was a total property loss of some where in the vicinity of 22,000,000."

"That represents a little better than 23 per cent of the loss," he was asked. "Well, you might say it is," replied Mr. Clinch, "but people today are what you might call becoming more educated. The great benefits of insurance had not yet been discovered in those days. The selling of insurance fifty years ago was not as easy as it is today. People then did not realize the great benefits accruing from it, but on the other hand you are confronted today with a great many more companies operating than there were at that time."

TO BE SUPERANNATED.

Mr. Clinch will retire today from active interest in the Board on superannuation. The Board which was formed about sixty years ago had a much smaller membership at that time. Today over 100 companies are members of the Board in the province. "I am going to miss the old associations," remarked Mr. Clinch, "you cannot work with people for a half century without leaving with some regret. During that time I have met thousands of people over the province and I will miss seeing them as much as I did. In that time I made many friends and a few enemies," he added with a smile.

Mr. Clinch will have the best wishes of a large number of friends for many more years of health. In the long period he has resided in Saint John he has identified himself with many associations and has been a valued assistant at boxing bouts, rowing contests and other sports. He is, above all, a keen horseman.
