GIVES TALK TO INSURANCE MEN

F. Maclure Sclanders Speaks of Features of Their Business

A vigorous and inspirational address by F. Maclure Sclanders, commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade, marked the opening session of the educational congress of the Life Underwriters Association of New Brunswick in the Georgian ballroom of the Admiral Beatty here this morning.

MR. SCLANDERS' ADDRESS

Mr. Sclanders cordially welcomed to the city the visiting life insurance men assembled at their disposal the Board of Trade facilities. He spoke of attending such congresses and trade gatherings in the United States.

THREE REASONS

Mr. Sclanders was especially pleased to address such a meeting as the present one for three reasons. First because he was an ardent advocate of insurance in every form and thought that everything that was liable to loss should be insured.
