Turkey Quits?

Unofficial advice is to the effect that discord has arisen between Germany and Turkey and that relations between the two countries have been severed. While there is no confirmation of the report, rumors have been current for some time that bad feeling existed between Turkey on the one side and Bulgaria and Germany on the other owing to the cessation of the Dobruja region of Roumania to Bulgaria.

The practice of calling upon the telephone operators for information as to the time of day has grown to the point of interfering with the efficiency of telephone service.

For such information 1,000 calls are made daily in St. John alone, and the total number throughout New Brunswick is much larger. The bulk of these calls come naturally at times when it is most difficult to handle them.

Also the practice of asking the night operators to call subscribers in the morning has grown. These calls average over 100 per morning.

Service efficiency now demands that the work of the operating force should be relieved of unnecessary burdens, and that all energies be directed toward the furnishing of effective telephone service, and to that alone.

Prompted by these considerations, the practice of giving the time of day and calling subscribers in the morning will be discontinued beginning August 1, 1918.

Orange Delegate Gave Address

Meeting Held in Centenary School Room — Visitors Are Entertained

"Don't think that that rumour at Guelph is all over; we are going to arouse Canada from end to end over this matter," said William Banks, a prominent Orangeman from Toronto (Ont.), who last night addressed a large assembly of members of the order in the Centenary church assembly hall.

"We are going to take a committee to Ottawa at the next session of the House, a bigger committee than the farmers took last session, and we want every representative in parliament who is not afraid of Rome to take his stand in this matter."

Francis Kerr acted as chairman. The address delivered by Mr. Banks was bubbling over with Scotch humor, and he kept his audience in fine fettle throughout. Following up his brief statement relative to the Guelph affair, he told some interesting things about the farmers' convention at Ottawa, of which he had been a delegate.

Of the response by the Orangemen throughout Canada to the call to arms he spoke with much pride. He said that they had proven true to the principles

of their organization and to their vows and were among the first to throw aside business interests and don the King's uniform. While others had not perhaps been so ready in their response to the call he pointed out that there were fields of endeavor in which the Orangemen had been remiss and had not given the attention deserving.

He referred to the splendid orphanages that had been erected by the Catholic church throughout Canada and similar institutions where the wayward and distressed were cared for. This the Orangemen of Canada had not done to the same extent, and he felt that the organization ought well to take a leaf out of the Catholic book in this connection.

Hon. H. F. Morphy, M. P., and George Boyce, M. P., prominent Orangemen of Toronto, who were to have been present to address the meeting, were unavoidably absent.

A short address was delivered by R. W. Wignmore, M. P., who dwelt upon the splendid work that had been done in this way by the Orangemen and the sacrifices they had made upon the altar of empire. He agreed with Mr. Banks that the Orangemen of Canada had not done enough in the matter of orphanages and homes of refuge, and in this there was a great work to be done. The double standard of morals, he said, was a curse to the Dominion of Canada, by which the unfortunate girl who filled the ranks to make necessary such homes of refuge was ostracized from society and the miserable wretch who had been the cause of her downfall admitted into the lodge rooms throughout the country.

Rev. W. R. Robinson gave a short address dealing with the Orange lodge throughout Canada and the work that had been accomplished.

The big assembly hall was crowded to capacity and many of the prominent Orangemen of the city were present.

Women members of the Orange order of this city entertained visiting delegates at lunch in the Royal Hotel last evening. Delegates from parts of western Canada were present.
