### The Outlook For Trade In Russia When War Ends

Siberia Depleted of All Neces-

factured Goods German Competition—Products of North America Should go Long Way in Replacing Those Formerly Secured

From Teutons Ottawa, Sept. 4—Siberia is depleted of all necessary supplies of manufactured goods, including the important lines of agricultural machines and implements, says a statement issued by the Canadian Department of Trade and Commerce. Imports from foreign countries have ceased and the situation is becoming serious. Russia will need to import from abroad large quantities of rolling stock, machinery and other equipment to put the railways and other industries of the country on an efficient running basis. This question will be of the utmost importance, since, owing to the financial position of the country Russia must utilize its natural resources and develop its industries to the fullest
