Thus far, in spite of all attempts it has been impossible to discover any other water supply, even adequate for the present condition of Delhi; far less, therefore, for that of a vast metropolis.

Lord Curzon also says that even the sites of the principal buildings, above all that of the palace for the viceroy, is unfortunate. He relates that when Governor-General of India, it had occurred to him that it would be well to convert the arena where Queen Victoria had been proclaimed Empress of India, and years later Edward VII. as Kaiser-Hind, into a beautiful and orderly garden, adorned with statuary, and thus creating a memorial that should be worthy of these great events. Work for this was dilly started, and went on for two years. At the end of that time it was found that the soil was so impregnated with alkali that nothing would grow, and that during the rains the whole place was inundated into a great marsh.

In response in the House of Lords the Marquis of Creve, Secretary of State for India, remarked that he trusted that Lord Curzon's views might prove exaggerated, and that everything possible would be done to secure the best sanitation for the city.

Labouchere's Will
Henry Labouchere's will betrays, in a very marked manner, his distrust, and his entire absence of regard or liking for his Italian son-in-law, the Marquis Carlo di Rudini, a familiar figure at one time in the Tenderloin of New York. Indeed, developed the same sort of sentiments with regard to him, as those entertained by his father-in-law—and the utmost astonishment was expressed by those who knew Labouchere, that a man so shrewd, and so quick to penetrate the character of his subjects.
