POLICE SURE NOW

No Longer in Doubt of Identity of Man on Liner.

WIRELESS FROM MONTROSE

No Arrest Has Yet Been Made on Board, Says Marconi Operator and All the Rest of the Passengers Are Quite Ignorant of the Drama Which Is Being Played About Them—Interest Is Intense.

Quebec, July 29.—On board steamer Montrose, by Marconi wireless, via Father Point, July 28.—Suspected persons answering police description of Crippen and Miss Leneve on board. No arrests made. Other passengers, who are all continentals, in ignorance of the situation. Montrose at 4 p.m. Thursday, 150 miles east of Belle Isle; weather foggy.

The foregoing message from Llewellyn Jones, Marconi operator on the steamer Montrose, was received in New York late last night, in re- sponse to an enquiry sent by wire- less earlier in the night.

It confirms apparently the belief of Scotland Yard that Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen and his stenographer are aboard the vessel.

London, July 29.—At a late hour last night Scotland Yard had not re- ceived official confirmation that Crip- pen is aboard the steamer Montrose.

Is Off Belle Isle.

Montreal, July 29.—A marconigram was received by the Canadian Pacific Co., yesterday afternoon, stating that at 12:30 the Montrose on which Dr. Crippen and Miss Leneve are sup- posed to be trying to escape to Canada, was reported 200 miles east of Belle Isle. This means that with fair weather and good progress the steam- er cannot reach Father Point until early on Sunday morning, and Quebec the same evening. Thus, although there are thirty special correspondents on board, no word of the drama can be sent to the leading papers of Canada, the United States and Great Britain, it will prob- ably be Sunday morning before defi- nite news is secured as to the where- abouts of the couple, or at least, whether they are on board the Montrose. The lack of wireless information from the ship has led C.P.R. officials to the conclusion that Capt. Kendall has been requested by Scotland Yard au- thorities to stop any such information being sent.

The Laurentine, on which Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard is supposed to be in pursuit of the fugitive, was reported at Belle Isle at five yesterday morning. At that rate it is calculated by the White Star Co., that she should be due at Father Point noon to- day, Friday, at Quebec that night, and at Montreal on Saturday morning. It was stated at the White Star offices yesterday that the company had no official knowledge that Inspector Dew was on board, and that he did not appear on the passenger list.

EOWLING THE LABATT TROPHY.

London, July 29.—H. W. Lind's rink of the London Rowing Club won the Labatt trophy yesterday, defeating J. S. Willison's Canadians.

The final score was 18 to 14 and the game was one of the best ever wit- nessed in the city.

The win of Lind was popular, but it cannot be said that Willison's loss was a popular one. In fact, judging by the applause, if Mr. Willison had won, his victory would have been just as popular as Lind's proved.

ROBBED WHILE HE SLEPT

MAN FROM LOS ANGELES LOST HIS MONEY IN TORONTO.

Toronto, July 29.—Thos. White is kicking himself for coming all the way from Los Angeles, Cal., to be robbed of \$245. White, besides being vex- ed himself made a complaint to the police and as a result David and Ed- ward Walsh, of 122 King street east, were arrested last evening.

Both men were intoxicated when ar- rested, and there were only charged with being drunk, but all the time they were suspected. On Edward Walsh \$151 was found and David had \$12. A number of the bank notes lost by White corresponded with those found on the Walsh brothers. They said that they had sold their furniture three days ago and that was why they had so much money. The police, however, happened to find out that the two Walsh brothers had not a cent to their name earlier in the day. The theft was committed while White was asleep.

LITTLE GIRL SHOT.

Revolver in Cousin's Hands Explodes Killing Five-Year-Old.

Hamilton, July 29.—There was a sensational shooting accident yester- day afternoon, in which Harriett Tabb, five years old, who lives at 287 Emerald street, was killed. The re- volver was in the hands of her cousin, James Leslie Sibbald, 12 years of age, of 116 Shaw street, Toronto, who was on a visit to his aunt, at whose home the fatality occurred. It was another case of not knowing that the weapon was loaded, and the little girl was killed almost instantly. Three doctors were on the scene shortly after the accident happened, but the bullet had entered the child's head, and they were unable to help her. The police investigated the affair and found that it was purely accidental.

The children had been playing, and upon their return between 2 and 3 o'clock were told to go up to the bathroom and wash their feet. When they arrived there, there was no soap, and young Sibbald climbed up to the shelf above a medicine chest, to get some. On the top of the chest he came across an old revolver, and, taking it down, began to examine it. The little girl was sitting on the edge of the bath with her feet in the water and Sibbald put the hammer back. It slipped from his fingers and dis- charged an old cartridge. As the weapon was pointed directly at the girl, the bullet entered her head behind the right ear, and she died almost in- stantly.

Will Meet in Stratford.

Berlin, July 29.—The 21st annual convention of the Canadian Associa- tion of Stationery Engineers and Printers met yesterday afternoon. The following officers were elected: President, J. J. Heeg, Guelph; vice- president, W. Norris, London; treas- urer, A. M. Weston, Toronto; con- ductor, J. A. Robertson, Stratford; doorkeeper, H. R. Clarke, Hamilton; secretary, W. A. Crockett, Mount Hamilton. The retiring president, Charles Kelly, Chatham, who has held the office for the past two years, was presented with a gold badge, suitably engraved. Stratford was the unanimous choice for the next annual convention in 1911.

C.P.R. Earnings.

Montreal, July 29.—For June, 1910, the gross earnings of the C.P.R. were \$2,807,217; working expenses, \$6,089,902; net profit, \$2,717,913. In June, 1909, the net profits were \$1,838,424, and for 12 months ended June 30, 1910, the figures are as follows: Gross earnings, \$94,389,490; working ex- penses, \$61,140,584; net profits, \$33,839,906. For the 12 months ended June 30, 1909, there was a net profit of \$38,935,875. The increase in net profits over the same period last year is therefore, for June, \$239,491 and for 12 months ended June 30 there was an increase of \$10,834,325.

A Dash For Liberty.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 29.—Yesterday morning a deer jumped the high fence around the property of the Lake Superior Corporation and en- tered the river above the rapids. It went over the rapids and was cap- tured by means of a launch and lasso. The deer was placed in the old ware- house and working hours later made its escape by jumping through a window, breaking a couple of strong iron bars, and again entered the river. When last seen it was swimming towards the American ship canal.

Censured the Railway.

Beaverton, July 29.—Censure was meted out to the Canadian Northern Railway by a jury in the case of Hunter, killed in the collision of an engine and a passenger train on July 29, for sending out an entire train of inexperienced men. The jury found that the victims were riding on a tender, contrary to the regulations of the railway, and against the orders of the train crew, and consequently at their own risk.

Bourke Will Not Be Prosecuted.

Toronto, July 29.—James Bourke will not be prosecuted in connection with the death of George Maynard, who died Wednesday in the General Hospital, after having been struck by Bourke in a row at North Bay two weeks ago. The post-mortem examina- tion will show that Matthews did not die as a result of the blow, but from a long-standing organic affection.

Rescued Four of the Crew.

London, July 29.—A telegram stating that the four members of the crew of the tug H. R. Bues had been picked up by a freighter, was received by Capt. George Bekard, of the tug James Edwards, when he reached here yesterday. The tug came from Leamington, Ont., to which point the rescued men were taken.

Charged With Serious Offence.

Woodstock, Ont., July 29.—William Walt, a young man employed at a local factory, was yesterday charged in the Police Court with a serious of- fence against a girl under 16. He was remanded until Saturday.

CLAWS OF BIRDS.

The Toes of Those That Perch and of Those That Run.

Let us note that the art of standing began with birds. Frogs sit and, as far as I know, every reptile, be it li- zard, crocodile, alligator or tortoise, lays its body on the ground when not ac- tually carrying it. And these have each four fat legs. Contrast the flamingo, which, having only two, and those like willow wands, tucks up one of them and sleeps poised high on the other, like a talp on its stem.

Note also that one toe has been al- together discarded by birds as superfluous. The germ or bud must be there, for the Dorking fowl has produced a fifth toe under some influence of the poultry yard, but no natural bird has more than four.

Except in swiftness, which never perch, but cling to rocks and walls, one is turned backward, and by a cunning contrivance the act of bending the leg draws them all automatically together. So a hen closes its toes at every step it takes, as if it grasped something, and, of course, when it settles down on its roost they grasp that tight and hold it fast till morning.

But to birds that do not perch this mechanism is only an incumbrance, so many of them, like the plovers, abolish the hind toe entirely, and the principle of all two legged runners, the ostrich, has got rid of the front toes also, retaining only two.—London Strand Magazine.

BOGUS PICTURES.

Counterfeit Antiques Openly Manu- factured in Italy.

Speaking of the manufacture of counterfeit paintings in Italy, a writer in the National Review says that some- times genuine old pictures are really discovered in peasants' houses, but rarely in good condition.

"The peasants have a disastrous trick of rubbing pictures with onions to clean them. By so doing they take off not only the varnish, but the precious patina and certain colors, in many cases leaving only the mere gold back- ground (supposing the picture is of that class) and the more deeply incised lines. These wrecks are eagerly bought for strife by art dealers, who employ skillful experts to restore or rather to remake them on the basis of the original outlines.

Pictures of the early period with gold backgrounds and quaint drafts- manship are regularly manufactured, especially at Siena, where the panels can be seen openly drying before the shop doors. Their foundation is a panel of properly worm eaten and chemically aged, painted on the gesso ground that was the basis for all pictures of this epoch and to which they owe their in- numerable qualities.

Such pictures are often made up out of a number of really old but ruined pictures and are an ingenious puzzle that require dexterity, taste and knowl- edge to construct.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN MONTHLY WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Mani- toba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agen- cy for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intend- ing homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence up- on and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own- ed and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quar- ter-section alongside his homestead for \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Mus- reside six months in each of six year from date of homestead entry (includ- ing the time required to earn home- stead patent) and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must res- ide six months in each of three years, cul- tivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
