

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London, Sep. 19.
The leaders of the International Society have promised the London Weavers to prevent the importation of foreign workmen to England, and the large Labor League have denounced the introduction of foreigners into English workshops as a dangerous political precedent.

The "Times" to day deplores the continuance of antagonism between labor and capital. The correspondent of the "Times" says that the British wheat crop is disastrously deficient.

The International Congress having for an object of reform the management of penitentiaries throughout Europe and America is to be held in London in June, 1872.

The Russian Squadron with the Grand Duke Alexis, has arrived at Plymouth en-voyage for New York.

Mayor Hall has removed Comptroller Connolly and appointed Gen. McLeilan in his place, but it is doubtful if the latter accepts.

There was a \$300,000 fire in St. Albans, Vt., yesterday; a \$100,000 fire in St. Paul, Minn., and a \$250,000 explosion of powder in Nevada.

A cyclone was experienced 40 miles Southward of Jamaica on Monday, P. M., travelling Westward.

An earthquake on 21st shook the Peruvian coast very seriously. The sea was greatly agitated and for a time it was impossible for vessels to enter the ports.

Since the recent surgical operation Queen Victoria has undergone rapid and decided improvement. Constant medical supervision is, however, considered necessary, and a prominent resident physician has been appointed.

A dispute has arisen between the proprietors of the Public Works, visited Greenville Canal yesterday for the purpose of devising means to raise water supply, as loaded vessels cannot get through. There were two hundred steamers and bargues bound detained, and two steamers were engaged in pumping water into canal to get them through.

No political news transpires; but Sir John is expected to speak at Kingston, on Washington Treaty, this week.

New York, Sep. 19.
Six persons were killed and twenty more injured by the powder explosion at Ft. Crockett, Nevada, and the damage exceeds quarter of a million.

Twenty nine convicts escaped from the Nevada State Prison, and in doing so, six men were wounded, including the Lieutenant Governor.

Cable advance advices state that there are hopes the strike in Manchester may come to an end, as the employers show signs of wishing to compromise.

The small pox is disappearing from Weymouth, England.

The Mount Cenis Tunnel was formally opened yesterday in presence of the representatives of France and Italy.

The failure of the new Customs Treaty between France and Germany is imminent.

The German Plenipotentiaries object to the alterations in the text made by the Assembly. Gold opened at 114 1/2.

Interchange of Postal Money Orders.
The convention for the interchange of postal money orders between Great Britain and the United States having been duly ratified, will go into effect on the 2nd day of October next, and the Post Office Department has now completed arrangements for its practical operation. Of the 2,455 money order offices of this country, 570 have been authorized to issue postal orders on the Postmaster at New York City, for payment in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and to pay orders issued by him for sums certified by the Post Office Department of that country for payment in the United States. These offices have been selected in all the States and Territories with a view of accommodating the localities where the greatest number of such foreigners reside as will be likely to make use of them. All exchanges are to be made through the two government exchange offices in New York and London. In this country applications can be made only for the equivalent in sterling of a certain sum of money in United States currency, which latter amount may be deposited at the local office, as transmitted to New York, and there converted into a postal sterling draft at the current rate for gold on the day of its receipt. The rates are as follows:—Not exceeding \$10, 25 cents; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 75 cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$40, \$1; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, \$1 25; [Amer. Newspaper Adv.]

FRENCH EMIGRANTS FOR CANADA.—Arrangements it is said, are in progress by an association of French gentlemen to purchase fifty thousand acres of land in one of the counties on the North Shore of the St. Lawrence, between Quebec and Three Rivers, for the purpose of establishing a colony of Alsacians. It appears that the natives of Alsace cannot reconcile themselves to the idea of living under their new rulers; they are in fact intensely anti German, and that feeling is cultivated by outsiders, some of whom have organized the present association. Correspondents of

London journals, writing from Alsace, say that the commercial and manufacturing classes in that Province see in Free Trade with Germany advantages which compensate them for change of flag, but the masses entertain an inveterate objection to their new rulers.

AN UNJUST CUSTOMS CASE.—In a recent case tried in the United States District Court for Northern New York, a curious point was decided. A person coming from Canada into the United States refused to allow certain trunks to be examined by the officers of the customs, whereupon the trunks were seized, opened, and ascertained to contain \$7,000 in coin and notes, besides certain articles upon which duties were payable. The act of Congress of June 27, 1864, Section 1, provides that, if any person passing goods through the Custom House refuses to allow any package to be inspected, it shall be deemed that he found to contain dutiable goods, the whole contents shall be forfeited. In the case above mentioned, suit was brought in the United States District Court, and the attempt to smuggle into the United States one shawl and one silk dress resulted in the forfeiture not only of the articles of clothing, but of the \$7,000 in coin.

FROM ST. JOHN TO BANGOR BY RAIL.—In a very few weeks at farthest, passengers may travel from St. John to Bangor by Railway, and from thence to all parts of the United States, Canada, and to the far off Pacific coast. The opening will no doubt be a grand affair, and worthy of the occasion. The highest officials in the Dominion and the States are to be present.—The President, Gen. GRANT, and Lord LISGAR, Governor General, will preside at the collation, which we learn is to be spread on the Bridge over the St. Croix which is to be covered over for the purpose, leaving room on each side of the ponderous table for the guests. The President sitting at the head on the U. S. side, and Lord Lisgar at the foot on the Dominion side, each supported by Generals and Cabinet Ministers. We learn that arrangements have been made on a liberal scale to make the occasion an enthusiastic one, long to be remembered as the peaceful union by iron bands of two great countries.

It is not necessary now to refer to the large minds which first conceived the idea of connecting the Province with the United States by Railway, it remained for the energetic E. R. BURRICK to push on and carry to a successful issue, the grand undertaking, not only on this side of the Line but in the States. While nothing the construction of Railways in this Province, of which the St. Andrews line was the pioneer, and the difficulties and discouragements which beset the undertaking, the "Carleton Sentinel" thus refers to our line:—

"The St. Andrews road has become a monument to the marvelous endurance and faith of its promoters—it has linked the St. Croix to the richest agricultural Counties in Maine and New Brunswick, and effected an alliance between the waters of St. Andrews Bay and the River St. John. It has done more, traversing a tract of country, for the greater part having as little pretensions to promise or to hope as one can imagine, it has made that once desolate district a valley where have been developed sources of continuous and vast traffic for the river, and of wealth as a return to those who industry and enterprise have made the desert thus to rejoice."

ACCIDENT.—Mr. John Cathcart, Jr., who was working at Cranberry Brook, York Co., while on his way to feed the horses on Thursday morning last, tripped over a piece of iron rail, and broke his right leg just above the ankle. He was brought to St. Andrews by train the same evening and the bones set by Dr. Parker. We learn the young man is doing as well as can be expected.

It is a pity that some of the English Sporting papers cannot find something better to do than aspersing the character of the "Paris Crew" of St. John. It is more cowardly to misrepresent the men, than it was for them to risk their lives in rowing a mere shell in a rough basin open to the wash of the sea. They can afford to treat with contempt such pusillanimous attacks.

The Rev. F. O'NEIL preached an eloquent and impressive sermon in the Catholic Church, on Sunday morning, to a large and attentive congregation, from the text "Seek first the kingdom of Heaven," pointing out and enforcing the duties of his hearers, as Christians; the blessing and happiness which attend a godly life, and urgently advocating a strict adherence to the tenets of religion. The Rev. gentleman also made a touching allusion to the recent death of a brother clergyman, who like himself was a native of St. Andrews, and received his earlier education at the Grammar School of this Town. Mr. O'Neil is a fluent and pleasing speaker; and although quite a young man, has in the State of New Jersey a large Parish with three Churches, of which he is officiating clergyman; he has also the supervision of a large day school. He left here on Monday morning by steamer on return to his charge, carrying with him the best wishes of his townsmen.

A COURT UNDER DIFFICULTIES.—In Rome county, Ark., a few days ago the Circuit Judge ordered out the militia with the ostensible purpose of protecting his Court and kept them during his term. They are reported to have committed numbers of depredations. The difficulty grew out of the differences between the Judge and sheriff, both Republicans. The latter was deposed by the former and a coroner substituted in his place. The sheriff refused to surrender his office and the Governor has been sought to solve the difficulty.

Another "fasting girl" has turned up in Lancashire. Anne Riding is the name of the new phenomenon, and her achievements cast those of her famous Welsh prototype quite into the shade. According to the London newspapers, Miss Riding for sixteen months has taken no food whatever. The only sustenance she can bear is "a drop of water with which to moisten her lips." When asked if she will take food, she always firmly refuses it. "She is conscious, but very weak."—as well she may be—"gets little sleep and cannot bear a lighted candle in the room at night-time." The last-named peculiarity, shared with so many of the spiritual philosophers, is full of suggestiveness, and may possibly, in the sequel, furnish a key to the mystery.

Christina Edmunds, the poisoner of Brighton, England, who has just been committed for willful murder, is apparently a crazy Brinvilliers. She distributed packets of poisoned confectionery in such ways as to lead the hapless victims of her arts to suppose that they were lost or left by accident. For a long time, the detectives were unable to discover the mysterious poisoner, though it was found that deadly drugs were skillfully concealed in the tempting packages left about the city. And no motive could be ascertained for the crime even when traced to the woman, who is now in a fair way to be kept out of such dangerous mischief hereafter.

Tuesday evening, as the Boston express engine was switching off cars at the depot at Fall River, a young lady and gentleman were crossing the track. Not seeing their danger, the lady was knocked down by the engine tender. Several of the 9th regiment band were passing at the time, and one of their number, Mr. Alexander, dropped his violin, and at the risk of his own life, seized the lady by the dress and dragged her out of danger. Another second and she would have been crushed to death under the wheels.

CUSTOMS' SEIZURE.—"From information received," we do not know how, Mr. Gorow and Mr. Hutton, Customs Officers, were led to visit Indian Island yesterday, and there seized the sloop, "Investigator," of St. Andrews, which had just landed a cargo of smuggled goods. The cargo, consisting of 26 packages of liquors, a bale of dry goods, a lot of sheepskins, and several barrels of flour, was at once put on board, and, with the vessel, brought to this port, arriving here about four o'clock this morning. The "Investigator" is commanded by Capt. Warren Browne. Her cargo is now being discharged, and it is worth somewhere about \$4,000 or \$5,000. Where the cargo was received we cannot say at present.—[Globe, 18th.]
