Adventurns of Wedlding Rings, In the year 1821, the wife of Ed wart Marriott, stocking-make
Sutton-in-Ashfield, having declin ed to wear her gold wedding ring wrapped it up in paper, tied round with a thread, and placed in a teacaddy not in common ise, which
was kept in a cupboard. The
caddy was a receptacle for many cadiy was a receptacle for many
other trinkets-as nechlaces, beads, \&c., which sometime, after, with what it contained, she gave to child, to pracifiy it during her absence. A long time after that missing the ring, she recollected, when sweeping the house floor, that she threw a bit of blue paper, tied round with a white thread, answering the description of that in which she inclosed the ring, on
the fire, and concluded it was lost for ever.
