The Tonnage Committee

The Tonnage Committee of the Government through their Secretary, Mr. T. A. Hall, Government Engineer (Mr. Hall is giving a number of speeches in connection with the general public to lay in their winter supply of coal as soon as possible). Their chief and only concern seems to be about the coal supply for St. John's, and no interest is expressed in the outport public who also use coal.

The Tonnage Committee should deal with the requisition for the whole Country.

Isn't it possible for our public men to be a little more broader and allow their thoughts and actions to get beyond the confines of St. John's?

We make no apology whatever for referring to this matter so frequently, for we believe we are performing a duty to outport people in calling attention to what appears to us to be neglect and lack of consideration on the part of our public men.

We are surprised that so many of our leading outport citizens—men of ability and learning—are seemingly content to be slighted and ignored in the matter of appointments to the Legislative Council, on Commissions and Committees of various kinds, while certain individuals in St. John's are serving on so many committees and Commissions that they have scarcely time to sleep. Are the brains and ability of the Country to be found only in St. John's?

Closing of Legislature

The Legislature closed on Wednesday afternoon last. While the House was in session several important Bills were passed and a National or Coalition Government was formed, which was approved by some and strongly condemned by others. A general election is scheduled to take place on September 17th. The Business Tax Bill of 20 per cent, on profits amounting to \$3000 or over was passed by the House of Assembly, but was killed by the Legislative Council, composed chiefly of business men, on Tuesday last.

On account of this action it is likely the House will pass a Bill when it meets again on August 16th entitling the powers of the Council. It is also expected that a tax on business profits in another form will be imposed. The Guardian stands for general conscription, i.e., a conscription of men, women, children and wealth in order to win the war and bring about an early Peace. What we mean is that all should be given something to do and be forced to do it, or as an alternative be given a trip to Germany.

Infantile Paralysis

During the week four cases of Infantile Paralysis were reported in St. John's. Every precaution is being taken to prevent this dreadful disease from spreading. The epidemic is said to be of a mild type. There are also thirty cases of diphtheria in St. John's.


