

St. Vincent, Barbadoes, Martinique and French
coast, upon the St. John, above Baker's, and also
upon the Guadalupe, which is carried down to the
Bay of Chaleur, in all amounting to some Millions
of feet. Beside this, there is the lumber cut by the
settlers under license from the Governor of New
France, who are allowed to do so, as we understand, that he has given such permission to the settlers at Mactawaka, the population of
which is 4000 or over. From this view of the case,
it will easily be seen that we might have a
hundred thousand trees, which will be almost
a house across the St. John before the month of
Grand river. Nothing to any effect will be accom-
plished without doing this, towards putting an end
to the ownership of our property. The lumber on
Fish river, which is the object of the plan pro-
posed. There is a drove six miles up Fish
river, three miles above its mouth, owned by Mer-
chants at the city of St. John. Sir John Caldwell
and Mr. John Scott, who are the proprietors of St.
John with 14 partners, have several
circular ones, all of which are the finest model
and construction, have been built within four or
five years past, and are superior to the mills on the
Penobscot river. He is supposed to be very rich
and has made every effort to employ his
power, the men who were taken on Fish river, by
our force, to haul the logs at 60 cents per thousand
for his mills.
