

An attemnted assassination of the Presi-dent of the United States little remembered now is that of Andrew jackson on January 30, 1835. by Richard Lawrence as the form-er was leaving the rotunda of the capital after attending the funeral of a Congress-man. Lawrence snapped two pistols at the President, but the percussion caps explod-ed in each case without igniting the pow-der. Lawrence was found to be insane.

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
