THE DELEGATES HOME FROM GREAT MISSIONARY CONGRESS HAVE MEETING IN ST. JOHN

J. N. Harvey, Percy Steel, S. R. Maxwell, W. A. Stelger, Rev. W. V. Higgins and Rev. Nell McLaughlin, delegates to the Canadian National Missionary Congress which met in Massey hall Toronto, returned to St. John yesterday.

Mr. Harvey went on to say that the Dominion Conference took place each morning and each denomination appointed a committee to participate with the general committee in drafting a national policy.

STATEMENT IS CORRECT SAYS MR. ROBINSON

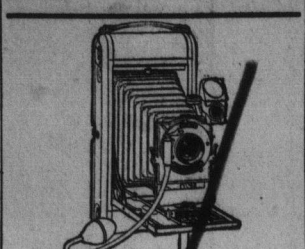

SPANGLER IN ANOTHER DO SUBJECT

In spite of the fact that the death of Mrs. Ann Lauchlan is growing rather owing to the fact that it is long out, it still attracts large numbers of spectators.

Last night's evidence brought the fact that Dr. Emery had been in at Dr. Spangler's request that the two had consulted a physician concerning Mrs. MacLauchlan's condition.

The Witnesses Mrs. Clara McDonald was the witness to go upon the stand, de Forest not being in court.

Complained of Heart Mrs. MacLauchlan often complained of her heart, but never of an ailment. Does not know what Dr. Emery's treatment was.

Spangler Advised Perfect To Mr. Teed—Deceased had that Dr. Spangler had said Mrs. MacLauchlan was to be kept quiet and was not to be moved.

Clarence de Forest was next Mrs. MacLauchlan had been to the house about one month ago. She had a severe attack March 12. On that date witness Dr. Emery.

On the 28th ult witness telephoned for that night by Miss Ly, who told him of Mrs. MacLauchlan's sudden attack and asked him to bring up some whisky. Mother ceased asked if it would not be better to call in another doctor.

On the night of March 12 told Dr. Emery that Mrs. MacLauchlan was worse and that Dr. Emery had insisted that another doctor be called. Dr. Spangler had called that night in presence of witness Emery and Spangler in Court.

Witness thinks Dr. Emery Spangler held a consultation with Mrs. MacLauchlan's condition. The purpose of raising the question was to get Dr. Spangler to do not object to attending Mrs. MacLauchlan because she was a patient of Dr. Spangler. Dr. Spangler used to attend Mrs. MacLauchlan through Dr. Emery's visit.

Had Sat up Two Hours Witness was present the Mrs. MacLauchlan's death prior to Emery's visit. Deceased was in the house at the time she died. She could not get up for a short time. To Dr. MacRae—Witness said.
