## THREE NEW MEN IN THE MARATHONS

The intention of the Marathon management to give the people good baseball and to place the team in a position where it can make a strong bid for first place in the N. B. and Maine league has borne fruit in the arrival in the city yesterday of three ball players who are said to be among the classiest ever brought to the city. The trio is headed by the well known and much advertised George Winters, the pitcher who has figured on the Boston and Detroit teams, and who last year pitched great ball for the Montreal team in the Eastern league. So favorably did Winters' work impress the manager Kelly of the Toronto team that the heavier was engaged this season to pitch for Toronto. There was a little difficulty about terms, however, and Winters, being an independent gentleman, refused to play for the money the Toronto manager offered. It is because of this difficulty that St. John is able to see him at all. He will be the chief heaver for the Marathons during the league season. Another box artist who arrived yesterday and who will be seen in the grey and red is Turbell, a left handed Indian pitcher from Burlington, Vermont. He also is a man with a record, and is expected to put up a great article of ball. The third new man is Williams, a fast, hard hitting third baseman who will replace Frank Shannon, who resigned to accept the management of a team in Massachusetts. A catcher for the team will arrive in a day or two. With the new men the Marathons should be in great shape, but the manager says that if the team is not then, strong enough to win they will bring in further new ones until they get a team to win the league.

Four members of the Marathons team will leave this morning for Boston, Frank Shannon, who resigned, will go as will Graverson, Estelle and Maloney. The manager says that he has friends here who are sorry to see them leave. Maloney who has not been in good health since coming to St. John, was especially popular and his friends feel that if he were to return here later in the season when the weather would help in restoring his pitching arm he would prove a welcome addition to the team.

Tommy Parle, the fast second sacker of the Marathons, is still in the city although a telegram arrived yesterday ordering him to report in Haverhill today. Tommy likes St. John and the St. John fans like him, and he would sooner remain here for the summer. An effort will be made to keep him here, but it is not known whether it will be successful. At any rate he will report in Haverhill today.

The St. John ball team will be strengthened and an announcement as to their new material may be expected in a few days.

The Marathons will leave on Tuesday for Woodstock where they will play that afternoon. There will be four games in the city this week. On Wednesday the St. John's and Marathons will play and on Saturday the Marathons and Calais will clash here. There will also be two games on Coronation day between St. John's and Marathons. It has not yet been decided whether these will be league or exhibition games. At any rate with both teams strengthened the fans should see some great baseball this week.

Manager Donald, of the Marathons, and Manager Mayer, of Woodstock, are looking into the matter of appointing professional umpires for the league games. Two of the men favored for the position are Danny Connolly, of this city and Umpire Doyle, of Calais.
