IRISH SUPPORTERS GIVEN SETBACK

The resolution had been favorably reported by the Foreign Affairs Committee and had been turned over to Representative Mason, Republican, Illinois, who was to handle it on the floor.

QUEBEC CONCERNS WATCHING FIRES

Taking Keen Interest in Progress of Forest Fires in This Province and Maine.

Montreal, June 3.—Lumbering interests with office here have been watching the progress of the forest fires of New Brunswick and Maine with keen anxiety. In this province, thanks to the stringent precautions taken by the Quebec Government, outbreaks have not been extensive and have been brought quickly under control before much damage is done. It is also understood that the Quebec Government will extend its efforts still further in the direction of airplane services, considerably augmented.

GUILTY OF MURDER IN SECOND DEGREE

Mrs. O'Dell Must Spend 20 Years in Prison for Assisting Her Husband in Murder Plot.

Rochester, N. Y., June 3.—A jury returned a verdict of murder in the second degree against Pearl Beavers O'Dell, charged with assisting her husband, James L. O'Dell, who is awaiting execution at Sing Sing, in the murder of Edward J. Kelly on the night of January 1 last. Immediately after the verdict Justice Robert E. Thompson sentenced her to 20 years' imprisonment at hard labor in Auburn Prison. The jury was out seven hours and a half.

EUROPE WATCHING DRY LAW WORKINGS

Taking Keen Interest in Conditions That Are Following in Dry Law's Wake.

New York, June 3.—Europe is watching with keen interest the conditions that are following in the wake of national prohibition. The manufacturers of every country in the world feel that if prohibition strikes America every other nation will soon follow. So Dr. F. RUSSIAN TRADE CONFERENCE NOT YET STARTED

Many Questions Must be Cleared up Before England Will Negotiate With Soviets.

London, June 3.—Trade negotiations between the Allies and Gregory Kressin, Russian Soviet Minister of Trade and Commerce, have not yet begun according to a statement by Premier Lloyd George in the House of Commons today. Replying to a flood of instant queries, the Premier said there were certain questions which Great Britain would undertake negotiations at all, these must be cleared up before the British or at home will negotiate. He said that the British must clear these questions out of the way before the Premier could proceed. Representatives of the French and Italian Governments are in London.

STATUS OF THE IRISH POLICE UNDER DEBATE

Despite Silence of Laborites, Nationalists and Asquithians Warm and Acrimonious Passages Followed.

London, June 3.—The greater part of the evening was devoted by the Commons to the discussion of the status of the Irish police under the Home Rule Bill, and the fact that neither the Laborites, the Nationalists nor the Asquithians were actively participating in the debate did not prevent occasional warm and acrimonious passages. The absence of criticism from the Opposition benches, however, is speeding the progress of the bill.

INTERVENTION IN MEXICO HAS BEEN SUGGESTED

Sub-Committee of U. S. Senate Demands Protection of American Rights and Properties.

Mexico City, June 3.—(Associated Press.)—The revolution which overthrew President Carranza and culminated in his death was attended by many interesting and exciting episodes which could not be reported to the outside while the coup was in progress. Some of the discoveries which have followed the installation of new quarters in the capital city, too, have been of interest.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE KING

Canada-West Indies Conference Sends Birthday Greetings.

Ottawa, June 3.—The Canada-West Indies Conference, today, despatched to the King the following message of congratulation: "The members of the Canada-West Indies Conference, assembled at Ottawa, present their loyal congratulations to His Majesty on the occasion of his birthday. Under the stern test of the world war an inflexible resolution and an unwavering unity of effort have enabled the people of the Empire in their defence of British ideals and institutions. Facing new problems in times of peace, we assure His Majesty of our conviction that a similar spirit of unity, and an equally high resolve will inspire all His Majesty's subjects in their determination to maintain and strengthen those institutions which have so happily joined us together in the past."

REDS CONTINUE TERROR REIGN OVER RUSSIA

Repatriated Swiss Report That Sixty to One Hundred Persons Executed Every Day.

Geneva, June 3.—The Red rule of terror is still in full force in Moscow and Petrograd, declare 600 Swiss citizens—men and women of all sorts and conditions—who have just been repatriated from Soviet Russia. That unanimous testimony from such a large body of thoroughly reliable and unprejudiced witnesses appears to outweigh all the denials that have been issued lately by the Red dictators. The Russian people sick, morally, unto death, say the refugees.

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CREDITS ARRANGED FOR CENTRAL EUROPE

Paris, June 3.—New and substantial credits for the relief and reconstruction of Central European countries, including Austria and Hungary, have been arranged by the Governments of Great Britain, Denmark, Holland, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland, it was announced today by the International Committee for Relief Credits. The credits are to be in the form of raw materials and food. Canada, Belgium and Spain have been approached but have not yet sent replies.

POLES FORCE BACK THE BOLSHEVIK

Recapture Many Villages Lost in Earlier Engagements.

Warsaw, June 3.—(By the A. P.)—The Poles have launched a counter attack south of Kiev in the Ros River region, where the Reds have concentrated in an endeavor to drive to the north-west in order to compel the Poles to evacuate Kiev. The Bolshevik forces captured some ground, but the official communication today announces that they were thrown back and several villages recaptured. The fighting continues.

POLLING UNDER SAD SURROUNDINGS

By-Election at South England Spiritless, the Place Being Under Shadow of a Great Calamity.

London, June 3.—(By Canadian Associated Press.)—Probably polling in a by-election has never taken place under sadder surroundings than at Louth today. The recent disaster to the little Lincolnshire town, due to the rising of the River Louth, caused both candidates to abandon further electioneering. The contest in any case has been the quietest. The fight is a straight one between the Coalitionists and Independent Liberals. Louth is a huge artificial constituency which has often yielded poll surprises. The late member, Captain Beckenham, secured a majority of over a hundred in the general election.

MONTREAL HAS A HOLIDAY

For the First Time in Many Years June 3rd Observed as National Holiday.

Montreal, June 3.—Sharp at noon today a Royal Salute of 21 guns was fired on Fletcher's Field here. There was no parade for the salute as most of the local militia is out of town. While most of the stores remained open, many of the city offices were closed and business generally was at a standstill. AUSTRALIA IS WITH IRELAND

Emancipatory, Western, Ireland, June 3.—Archbishop Kelly, of Sydney, N. S. W., at a public welcome given in his honor today, advocated self-determination for the people of Ireland. The Archbishop said that, so long as the people of Ireland were united on a practical policy, Australia would be of their back.

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
