



Drury, commanding the Royal Canadian artillery, writes from Pre-toria under date of Sept. 13th. He sends his diary, which covers from Aug. 23rd to Sept. 13th, but it contains nothing of importance. Chaplain Cox proceeded to Bloemfontein and secured a truck of Canadian Red Cross stores. Lieut. Col. Evans' report is dated at Nooitgedacht on Sept.15th. The battalion had a skirmish with the Boers. The enemy retired after the Britishers firea two shells. The field state shows on par-ade 188; sick, 95; missing, one, and the remainder engaged in various occupations. Corp. 
