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CLAIMS VAST ESTATE QUEBEC

Aged Lewiston Man Thinks Millions of Property Belong to Him

Land Was Confiscated

Chateau Frontenac and Plains of Abraham Part of the Tract Louis J. Lambert Says Belonged to Ancestors—Hearing Sept. 8 to Settle the Matter.

Lewiston, Me., Aug. 26.—Louis Joseph Lambert, one of the oldest French residents of Lewiston, believes that he has succeeded in securing evidence to establish his title to property in the city of Quebec, which is claimed to be worth about \$200,000.

Mr. Lambert will be 80 years old in October. For the last 40 years he has been trying to prove to them a claim to the possession of his ancestral lands in Quebec, which he claims to be worth about \$200,000.

Mr. Lambert was an officer in the French army. His wife also owned 103 acres of land in Quebec, inherited from her father. In 1763 Colonel Lambert gave a large portion of his property and that of his wife was confiscated. Upon his death his business affairs were in a very complicated and unsettled condition, and they have never been straightened out since. His son, Louis Ignace Lambert, father of the present claimant, never settled his father's property.

In 1867, \$150,000 were realized from the sale of the Lambert estates, and it was proposed to divide this between the English and French churches of Quebec, as the rightful heirs of the property were not known, but this division was not allowed by the privy council.

In this same year it was decreed that the property and its earnings belonged to the descendants of Colonel Lambert.

Ignace Lambert, son of Colonel Lambert, had three sons and a daughter. The sons were Ignace, Flavien and Louis. The daughter was Marie.

Mr. Lambert is still living. His father's father lived to be 103, and his grandfather to be 100. Mr. Lambert now feels certain of his ability to prove his claim. He has the marriage certificate of Colonel and Mrs. Lambert, records of the births and deaths of descendants and other valuable papers.

The property is situated in the heart of Quebec, the Chateau Frontenac and the Plains of Abraham being included in it. The relatives of Mr. Lambert have been ordered to restore the property to Mr. Lambert, but they have refused to do so.

Mr. Lambert has three children, former City Clerk William Lambert, Louis Lambert, and a daughter, Mrs. T. H. Crockett, with whom he lives.
