ONLY THREE TRIES IN MADAWASKA'S COUNTY COUNCIL

Edmundston, N. B., Oct. 28—Municipal elections were held today in the county of Madawaska. All the former members offered for re-election and went in by acclamation, with the exception of the parish of St. Jacques, where three candidates were in the field which necessitated an election. Ex-Councillor Bosse was defeated by his opponent of two years ago, Louis St. Onge.

In the new council there will be 17 Liberals and 3 Conservatives.

A vote was taken in the parish of St. Hilaire for the abolition of liquor licenses in that district. Only 15 voted to retain licenses and 148 against, so after May next St. Hilaire will be "dry."

That a record volume of freight will be handled through the port of St. John during the coming winter season is the word given out by those conversant with offerings and bookings for business here, and it is said that shipments from St. John will depend only on the number of vessels available and the extent of cargo space which may be utilized.

Brief Despatches.

Manila, Oct. 27—A typhoon has partly wiped out the town of Tobasco. One hundred persons were killed, and the railroad line was washed away.

The governor-general is sending a relief expedition to the stricken district.

Toronto, Oct. 26—The Consumers' Gas Company of this city in its annual report states that there are 800 vacant houses in the city, that in the year ended Sept. 30 the company sold \$29,498 less gas. The actual deficit on the year's business was \$218.

Paris, Oct. 27—The correspondent at Hazebrouck, France, of the Havas News Agency, sends the following:

"It is learned that M. Foulon, a priest of Standon, near Roulers, who received an order from Germany to deliver French soldiers supposed to have been concealed in his presbytery, was shot at point blank before he could give a reply, and killed. Three other persons are reported to have met the same fate."

Pittsburg, Oct. 25—Eleven girls and one man employed in the factory of the One Paper Box Company on the north side are known to be dead, eight girls are badly injured, and a number of others are missing, as the result of a fire which this afternoon started in the feed store of James Brown & Company, and spread to the factory. Firemen searching the ruins of the three-story factory recovered the bodies. They searched in the dense smoke.

Ottawa, Oct. 26—A suit which concerned the division of profits on \$600,000 of houses sold to the French government by Sir Clifford Sifton and his son, Major John W. Sifton, brought by Lieutenant Percy Shaver, of Ottawa, former secretary of Sir Clifford Sifton, which began in the Ontario Supreme Court, ended yesterday with a judgment in favor of the plaintiff.

All that Sir Clifford Sifton or his son would say was that a substantial payment had been made to Lieutenant Shaver.

Charlottetown, S. C., Oct. 25—The Mallory liner Colorado, which sailed from Charlottetown last night with cotton for New York, caught fire and was abandoned according to a wireless message received here today from the steamer Suvanna. The Suvanna reported the burning vessel had been sighted off Cape Roman, 80 miles north of here. It was reported that a Merchants & Miners steamer had rescued the crew.

The Colorado carried 25 passengers. Savannah, Ga., Oct. 25—The crew of the Mallory liner Colorado, reported afloat and abandoned at sea, is safe aboard the Clyde liner Lenape, which is now off the mouth of the Savannah river, according to a wireless message received here tonight.

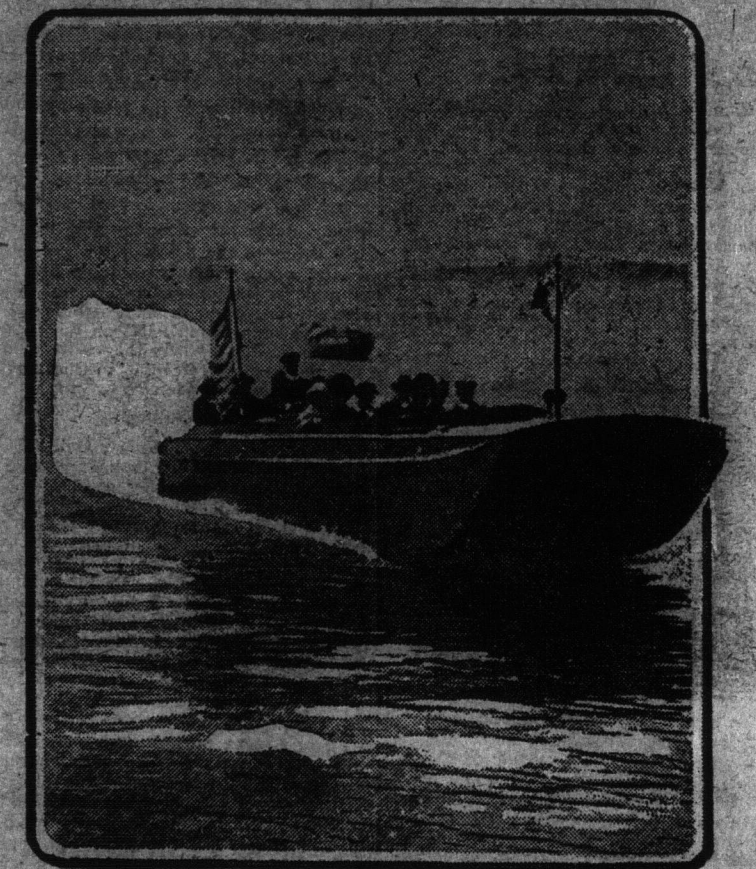
