





e did his duty as a soldier and a man nd died nobly. Here are the details as got them: "At 4 p. m. on Oct. 8, the enemy tarte dto shell our trenches, particular-y around No. — trench, where C com-any was stationed. Harold was all round the trench at different times, rai-ying his section together, when about 30 p. m. a piece of shrapnel struck him. The only lived four or five minutes. "I did not see him, however. I left amp here about 5.30 that night with the rations for my company in the renches. We were held up on the road or over an hour till the heavy bombard-nent had quieted down. I went over to eadquarters (regimental) to hear if any f twelve platoon were hurt, as I had eard of Corporal Munro's death. He vas hit by a piece of shrapnel about 45 p. m. that same day, and lived tin minutes. One of his brothers was over o see him on Saturday, before the bat-alion went into the trenches for the sec-md time. I had quite a long talk with im. "Poor Harold1. He wasn't very well

However, I was informed of it offi-tially next morning by Captain Marge-on, Oct. 9. "I wrote our second pay sergeant, H. Winthrop, at the Canadian pay office, ondon, to cable home to Archdeacon armitage, so he could break the news o you."
