SUMMER SCHOOL COURSES CONTINUED

Large Audiences Attend Every Session

The second day of the Summer school is being held at the Lutheran Seminary, and the attendance is very large. The sessions throughout the entire day and evening were beyond all expectations and so elated are the committee having the courses in charge that already arrangements are being made for the holding of next year's school. As on the opening day the large audience were held spell bound with the fine orations as delivered by the different speakers, they being the finest ever heard in town.

No one could sit and listen to the different addresses and lectures without being proud that they were part of that Great United Lutheran Church which has such a great work ahead of it. As the speakers unfolded the scope of the work one gets a vision of our mission in the world.

It leads us out of our narrow selfish ideas to think of the church as large and of the great message with which God has entrusted us as a Lutheran Church.

In a powerful address Dr. Little, Dean of the Seminary told why it was that the Lutheran Church could not enter into the Unionist Movement of the day.

Our vision was enlarged and widened when Dr. Hoffman of Toronto told us of the great field for the Lutheran Church in our Canadian Northwest.

There is a great field open and a great opportunity for the advancement of our church if men and means could be secured.

Rev. W. Kruenecke of Buffalo in a stirring address traced the history of Inner Mission work and defined it as the active expression of the whole body of believers. Its aim was to conquer everything which was Anti-Christ.

Rev. Dunsberger took us to India and showed what the Mission work had done for that country. Three things were being accomplished:

First—A breaking down of the caste system.

Second, creating a new educational interest, and third—the gradual transformation of life from dirt and sin to clean and pure lives.

Rev. Luther Hogshead of Chicago in his address on Home missions and the Foreign Land showed that the country's future rested in the child life in educating them to be loyal citizens, to be faithful to the church so that it may become strong and pure and throw her influence into the foreign land.

At the evening session which was held on the campus, a large and appreciative audience listened to three stirring and soul thrilling lectures.

Rev. Hunt gave his second lecture on Sunday School work entitled "The Teacher." He presented a handful of Pens which thoroughly outlined the work and responsibility of a S.S.

teacher. Here they are:—Position—next to Pastor.—2. Personality—the door to the soul.—3. Preparation—a lack of which is a crime.—4. Purpose—to reach the heart with a gospel message.—5. Punctuality—Be on the minute.—6. Power—communion with God.—7. Practice.—8. Problems.—9. Patience and above all Prayer.

After the address the audience was delighted with the singing given by St. Mathews choir Kitchener.

The climax of interest and expectation came when Dr. Knobel of New York, President of the United Lutheran Church of America was introduced to the audience.

Dr. Knobel in an eloquent way outlined the principles of unity of the United Church. Rising to express thanks on behalf of the audience to Dr. Knobel, Dr. Hoffman pointed out that it was the first time a President of the Body to which our Canadian church belonged ever set foot on Canadian soil. It showed an interest which hitherto had not been shown. Rev. Maurer moved a rising vote of thanks to Dr. Knobel for his presence.

It was a scene long to be remembered when the great audience in the gathering dusk arose to show their appreciation to our first President. He has so fell in love with Waterloo that he hopes he will visit us often to encourage on Canadian Church to greater things.

Mr. H.B. Gerhardt in a spirited address illustrated the practical side of the working force of the Lutheran Brotherhood. The Women's Missionary Society have a fine display of India lace hand made by the Christian widows of India which is finding ready sale. We are looking forward to Rev. Dunsberger's illustrated picture tonight on "Foreign Missions. Do not fail to come.

United Farmers Will Not Unite

FARMERS REMEMBER FAILURES OF THE PAST

FENELON FALLS Ont. June 26—E.C. Drury addressed the United Farmers of Ontario to-day and said: "It has been suggested that there should be something of union between the United Farmers of Ontario and the party temporarily led by Mr. D.D. McKenzie because, it is said there is no real difference between the policy of the two organizations."

"There is a difference. The Liberal party when in power failed to translate into deeds the policy it had put into words. The United Farmers have a policy to which it is determined to live effect. Between the United Farmers and the dead, defunct and discredited Liberal organization there can be neither amalgamation, unification, or indorsement."

"Individual adhesion by men of like vision from cities and towns we shall welcome but no amalgamation with or indorsement by either of the old party organizations will be accepted. We intend to show our own road and keep it clean ourselves."
