Want Hydro Service

DEPUTATION FROM NORTH
HURON AND BRUCE SEE SIR
ADAM BECK.

A deputation numbering about 25 from North Huron and Bruce waited on Sir Adam Beck and urged the extension of the Hydro-Electric service and Hydro radials for their counties. The municipalities represented were Kincardine, Ripley, Lucknow, Wingham, Teeswater, Blyth, Brussels, Wroxeter, Gormie and Fordwich.

A deputation numbering about 200 will wait on Premier Heaton and the Minister of Public Works to-morrow at 2 o'clock, and urge the construction of a provincial highway from Toronto to Sarnia, passing through Brampton, Guelph, Kitchener and Stratford.

Ontario's Fire Losses

708 FIRES IN FEBRUARY, WITH
LOSS OF NEARLY HALF MIL-
LION.

There were 708 fires in Ontario during February, causing a total loss of \$496,783, of which \$364,109 was covered by insurance, according to the statistics of the Fire Marshal's Department. During the corresponding month of 1918, there were 887 fires, causing a total loss of \$956,846, of which \$750,350 was covered by insurance.

February of this year is the second best month the department has experienced.

Brantford, March 26.—A ballot of the ratepayers of Bellevue will be demanded by the Brantford Township Council before the annexation project goes into the Ontario Municipal Board.

A Valuable Tree.

Port Dover, March 26.—Jesse Thompson has cut down a walnut tree on the Colonel Gilbert farm which measured five feet in diameter at the base. In addition to yielding two logs, one fourteen feet long and the other twelve feet long, some of the limbs are two feet in diameter, and will be utilized. The stump will also be dug out, and will command a good price. The tree was planted by Colonel Gilbert 87 years ago.

Concrete Road Experiment.

Bridgeburg, March 26.—The Welland County Council, which recently decided to expend \$175,000 for good roads this year, has also decided to build a concrete road through the village of Ridgeway as an experiment, 16 feet wide. If this roadway meets with success, the County Council will likely build an entire concrete road through Ridgeway into Crystal Beach.

This work has been started as the result of a petition of a number of Bertie township and Ridgeway residents. If the proposed stretch of roadway in Bertie township meets with success, it is likely that the County Council will abandon its road construction.

This money has all been collected from Canadian people in Kitchener. I would ask you to distribute this amongst the poor according to your own judgement. Answer me in English and Syrian and put your full name to same."


Twenty-Five Hundred Engagements.

Dept. of Public Health

IS TO BE ESTABLISHED.

OTTAWA, March 26.—Hon. Wesley Bowell has announced the creation of a Department of Public Health in the House of Commons this afternoon. This department will be headed by a Minister of the Crown. Besides looking after the general health and the prevention of disease, special attention is to be given to the preservation of child life and child welfare and the medical care of immigrants. A Dominion Council of Health is also to be appointed, of which the Deputy Minister will be chairman, and the membership to consist of the chief executive officers of the health departments of the different provinces, and three others to be named.
