This statement was made here today by Dempsey's manager who further announced that Dempsey would meet Georges Carpentier in an elimination bout before July 4 if such a contest was considered desirable.

Fort Worth Texas Jan 30—Ted Rickard, boxing promoter who was here last night en route to the Ranger Oil field where he has some holdings, announced that he wanted to arrange with Jack Dempsey to meet Jess Willard, providing Dempsey sustains no injuries between now and next July when the world's championship bout is to be staged.

Associated Powers Have

MEETS ARMISTICE COMMISSION

PARIS, Feb. 1.—Preliminary peace terms will, this month, probably be presented to Germany along with conditions for a further renewal of armistice, if present plans are not defeated.

Recognizing the need for the return of the world to a normal peace time basis, the nations associated against Germany are considered making a peace of right and justice.

Bernstorff on Peace Which Would be Haile

WISHES LEAGUE OF NATIONS

BERLIN, Feb. 1.—A statement has been given the Associated Press by Count von Bernstorff, after consultation with the German Foreign Minister, which may be accepted as being what official Germany would consider a peace of right and justice. "A league of nations must be the most essential part of peace settlement," says Bernstorff's statement. "No other agency can carry forth a world of order."

His statement professes complete agreement with the first four points of Wilson's program and also comes free and impartial adjustment of all colonial claims; asserts Germany's disinterestedness with regard to Russia, except as to the prevention of the spread of Bolshevism; and announces willingness to pay for all damage done to civilians in Belgium and France, so far as the damage can be proven due to German aggression; a restoration of Alsace-Lorraine to France is resisted and regarding this and any other proposed territorial changes it held that a peace of right and justice presupposes that the principle of self-determination will be made superior to all territorial questions; the question of the guilt for the war should be submitted to a neutral commission. "The German people, in a vast majority, do not feel guilty, although they do not deny mistakes were made," concludes Bernstorff.

Called to Eternal Rest This Morning

Mr. George Sales, formerly of Detroit, Passed Away.

There was called from this life this morning Mr. George Sales, formerly of Detroit, who passed away at the home of Mrs. Scheffele, 104 College street, after a prolonged illness.

Mr. Sales had been ailing for about five years, particularly during the last two. Despite tender care and medical attention during that long period his condition became more serious and gradually weaker. The sufferer from the grim reaper finally removed another from this earthly home. There he had been bereft from the family circle and the sphere of a wide friendship, a loving husband and a genial and kind associate.

The deceased was 37 years of age. He was born in England but within two years of age came to this country with his parents.
He resided in Woodstock with the family during the early period of his life. Subsequently he resided in Detroit, where he was engaged as a Great Lakes ship draughtsman up to two years ago when his illness necessitated his withdrawal from the post of duty.
Surviving him are his wife (Lizzie Wuest of this city) and one year old adopted son. There also survive him his mother, Mrs. Harriet Sales of Woodstock, who is now in the West; one brother and two sisters in Woodstock; one brother and one sister in the West and one brother overseas.

The bereavement to the wife, mother, brothers and sisters will be felt by many friends who knew the deceased and the hour of painful affliction a community's sympathy is with those who have been bereft of a loving husband, son and brother.

The funeral will be held at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon from 104 College Street, thence to Mount Hope Cemetery for interment.
